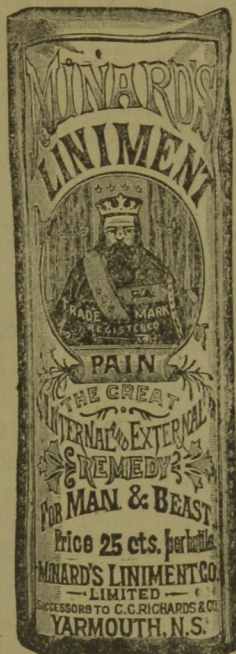

1913—British House of Commons rejected a measure for woman suffrage.

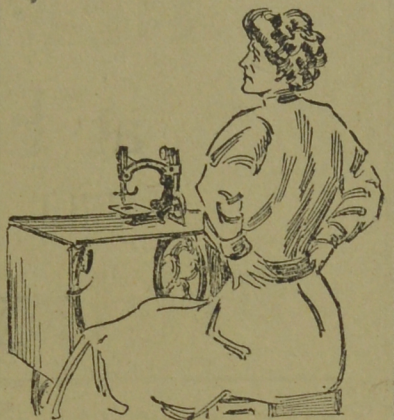

ASTOR-HUNTINGTON NUPTIALS DESCRIBED

Staatsburg, N. Y., April 30—The wedding of Vincent Astor and Helen Dinsmore Huntington daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert P. Huntington, took place at 12.30 o'clock today in the library of Hopeland House, the home of the bride's parents, which overlooks the Hudson. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. C. H. Duncan of St. Margaret's Church and only the immediate relatives and a few close friends were present.

It was the first time in about three weeks that Mr. Astor has been seen below stairs. Even last night it was thought that he might not be able to come down to the library for the ceremony. This morning, he showed a decided improvement so much so that it was said that the young couple might soon put out to sea on their contemplated Mediterranean honeymoon, as they had planned to do before Mr. Astor was taken suddenly ill with congestion of the lungs at the bride's home.

There was no note of illness however, apparent about Hopeland House preceding the wedding. The guests from New York arrived on a special train which left the Grand Central depot at 9.40 o'clock and which by special arrangement stopped to leave them at 12.35 o'clock. Big automobiles were waiting for them and they were whirled through the winding hills to the large brick pile standing near the bluish mist-hung Hudson.

GRAY DAY OUTSIDE

Outside it was a gray wet day, with rainy puddles on the gravel about the mansion, courageous chirping among the robins, in the southward hollow and noisy conversation among the sparrows at the window ledges. It was known that the date for the wedding was being kept despite a serious relapse Mr. Astor suffered three days ago. GOWN OF OLD LACE.

The bridal gown was of rare old lace and tulle with a court train of

ivory white satin. The lace used in the gown and the bridal veil were worn by the bride's mother and maternal grandmother of the weddings. The unusual feature of the gown was that it was almost entirely of lace and tulle instead of being white satin relieved with case.

The wedding was marked by simplicity in every detail, the "simple country wedding" flavor failed nowhere. The guests were the immediate members of the Huntington and Astor families invited by informal notes or telephone messages.

The wedding breakfast was laid by the southern end of the house.

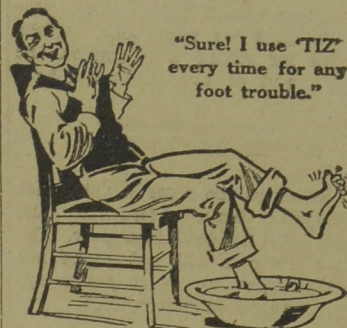
