RESERVE THE DATE

WATER RISING FAST.

The water in the river is rising fast but is still a couple of feet below the highest point reached last year. The steamer Victoria did not make her first trip from St. John yesterday, but is expected on Thursday.

RUN OF BANK LOGS.

The run of bank logs at Springhill is now on, about one hundred joints arriving today. The prices are about normal, \$10 to \$14. Fraser Limited and Randolph & Baker were buying this morning. A heavy run is expected tomorrow.

LEAVING FOR NEWCASTLE.

The Ethel May Shorey Company closed their engagement at the Opera House last evening and will leave this evening for Newcastle. The company is one of the best now on the road but owing to divers other attractions they did not get a very large patronage in this city.

LATE ERNEST J. HARTNEY.

The funeral of the late Ernest J. Hartney took place this morning from his late home, St. Mary's, and was largely attended. High Mass of Requiem was celebrated at St. Anthony's church by Rev. Father Ryan. Interment was made at the Hermitage.

JUNK LAW AMENDED

The City Council has amended the bylaw for the licensing of junk-dealers by placing the fee at \$100 for a dealer and \$25 for each employee. Licenses are to be numbered and the number is to be painted plainly upon the wagon used by the dealer and beside the door of his premises. A register of all goods purchased is to be kept in English.

TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE.

The Transportation Committee of the Board of Trade met last night and prepared its case for presentation before the Railway Commission when it meets here on Monday next to consider the complaint of discrimination in passenger rates against Fredericton on the part of the C.P.R. A. R. Shipp, K.C., M.P.P., is to be the counsel for the committee.

AN EXPERT OPINION

Fredricton Gleaner:—"The policy of the Borden Government is that there must be no breath of suspicion against its business methods. If it has been deceived, either by its officials, or by its friends, it wants to know it; no trucking with loose or dishonest practices will be tolerated, nor will any games of hold-ups by political conspirators or political trucksters be permitted."

QUESTION UNSETTLED.

A. E. Hanson, who made a survey for the extension of Aberdeen street for the city, appeared before the City Council in committee last night and stated that the power-house of the Palmer-McLellan Shospack Factory was encroaching on the street-line. J. L. Feeney, former city engineer, appeared and stated that the power-house was not on the street-line. It was decided that Ald. McKnight should investigate the matter and try to find whether or not the power-house was on the street-line.

SCHOONER ARTHUR M. GIBSON.

The tern-schooner Arthur M. Gibson, built by the late John Gibson at the mouth of the Nashwaak about twenty-five years ago, is discharging coal at the Dominion government wharf for Patrick Farrell. She is the first vessel to use the wharf. The tern-schooner H. H. Chamberlain finished discharging yesterday and was towed to St. John today. R. T. Daint discharged both vessels and was done with the Chamberlain in a day and a half a record for that schooner.

Program of U. N. B. Encaenia Announced--R. L. Simms Valedictorian--Addresses by Dr. A. S. MacKenzie and Prof. Miller

The program for the U.N.B. encaenia to be held in the University Library on the afternoon of Thursday, May 14, has been issued by Chancellor Jones with the university invitations to attend the closing exercises of the college. The class of 1914 contains twenty-nine members five of whom are young ladies. The division of the class according to classes is as follows--Arts 12, Civil Engineering 9, Electrical Engineering 5, Forestry 3. The terminal examinations are now being conducted at the University. The customary social events including the senior class dance, the senior class dinner, and Chancellor and Mrs. Jones' reception will take place next week. The dinner will be held at the Queen Hotel on the night of Tuesday May 12 and the dance in the college gym on the following night.

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QUESTIONS OF
CARE OF TREES
LEFT UNCHANGED

On Opposition Developing in City Council Ald. Lemont Withdrew Resolutions--Some Lively Passages Among the Aldermen

The matter of better protection and care for the trees of the city, remains as it was, the members of the City Council displaying such opposition to the proposal to place the trees under the supervision of Prof. Miller of the Forestry Department of the U. N. B. or even to have him make a plan of the city showing the location and varieties of trees.

Ald. Lemont withdrew two resolutions on the matter and said that the aldermen who had displayed so much ignorance on the subject at the meeting should take advantage of the address Prof. Miller would deliver on Monday next before the Board of Trade. During the discussion there were some lively brushes among the aldermen.

Two propositions were advanced by Prof. Miller. One was to prepare a plan for two hundred dollars, the other to prepare a plan and supervise the trees for one year for \$250. Ald. Lemont was strongly in favor of some change in the handling of trees and had a resolution covering each proposition.

ALD. EBBETS OBJECTS.

Ald. Ebbett said there were New Brunswick Acts which a little city resolution could not alter. He quoted from an act of the Legislature with regard to the powers of telephone companies in which it was stated that the official in charge of trees along roads and streets was the superintendent of roads. Under that legislation the supervision of the

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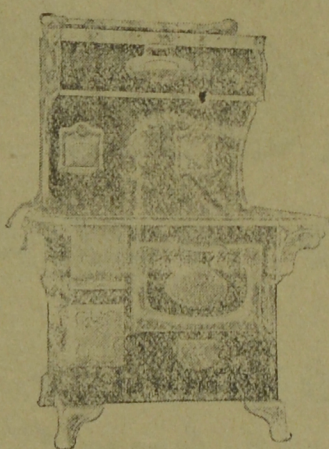

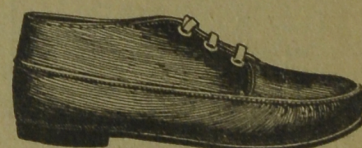
