### MOTORS MAKE DEAR TEA, SAYS LONDON PAPER

Tea, all except China, has gone up in price from two-pence to fourpence a pound since this time last year. The finest Indian has gone up fourpence, ordinary Indian and Ceylon teas two-pence a pound.

The effect of the shorter supplies of tea is just beginning to be felt in the present rise of price.

accuracy of the British gunnery.

### GERMAN TRAP FAILED.

At another stage of the great battle the Germans massed near a wood. The British lay well away from them on one side and the French under General Pau on the other. Some desultory firing took place, and the Germans tried to hide their real strength under cover of a forest but the allied commanders had been well supplied with information and were on the alert. The Germans' right asked for an armistice for the purpose of attending to the wounded and burying the dead, but whilst this request was under consideration a British aeroplane got onto the fact that the Germans were setting a trap for the allies. Negotiations were at once broken off, and the fighting commenced. An airman had seen an immense number of guns enter the woods, the foe having evidently planned to put up some thing in the nature of a sham fight and then retreat so as to draw the British pursuing force right on the top of the hidden guns. It was a well planned death-trap but the allies by this time were aware of the tactics of a not too scrupulous foe. The motive behind the request for an armistice was either to lull the allies into a sense of security or enable fresh German troops to arrive from Compiègne.

### HOW THE ALLIES REPLIED.

A terrific cannonade at once opened upon the Wood, which took fire, and as a brisk wind was blowing the flames soon turned the forest into an inferno. The Germans rushed out in great disorder, and the British, who were waiting fell upon them hip and thigh, the men, remembering all that had been done to them and to the peasantry, fought with a terrible fury and wiped out the score. The German commander concentrated his energies upon saving his guns but just at this point the allied commanders decided to frustrate him and much fierce fighting took place around the artillery, the British cavalry distinguishing itself by its dash and determination in sweeping down upon the German horse that was trying to escort the guns to a place of safety. They went through them like an avalanche, and it will be a long time before those Teutons who escaped forget the headlong rushes of our hard riders.

**CAVALRY COMPLETED THE ROUT**  
Once again was it clearly demonstrated that the cavalry arm is still one of the most effective an army can possess when used at the proper moment and in the right way. Cavalry may be useless against men entrenched in kopjes but in the open field is as effective as in the days of the first Napoleon. Not only did the Cavalry prevent the German guns from escaping but by a lightning-like delivery of charge prevented the gunners from which to work havoc on our infantry.
