COLLECTORS HAVE MADE A SPLENDID BEGINNING

Upwards of Three Thousand Dollars Was Raised on Thursday in a Little More Than Two Hours

The work of soliciting for the local branch of Canadian Patriotic Fund was commenced in earnest yesterday and last night the collectors reported having secured donations amounting to over \$3,000, as a result of a little over two hours canvassing.

A loyal response is being made for the cause and in some cases where the citizens had not fully decided upon the amount they would contribute to the fund the collectors consented to make a second appeal at a later date.

The canvassing committee is composed of ten members and they will endeavor to collect \$10,000 in five days. After the work is thoroughly inaugurated it is expected that a large committee of ladies will be appointed to undertake a house to house canvass of the entire city.

Yesterday Mr. George Y. Diblee contributed part of the proceeds from his soda fountain toward the fund and it is altogether likely that this method of securing donations will be followed by a number of the prominent merchants along Queen Street.

71ST. REGT. BAND'S TRIP TO VALCARTIER OFF FOR THE PRESENT

Military Authorities at Halifax Wire Major Grey That Capt. Guthrie's Order to the Band Was Unauthorized

It is not a very opportune time for practical jokes, but Capt. Guthrie, who is now at Valcartier with the expeditionary force, appears to have put one over on the band of the 71st Regiment. On Tuesday he wired Bandmaster White that twenty five members of the band were wanted at Valcartier and that transportation and pay would be arranged. In response to a message sent by the bandmaster for further particulars a telegram was received by a local news paper man from Capt. Guthrie stating that the band was wanted for foreign service and should arrange to leave here on Friday evening. Major Grey, the officer commanding the 71st Regiment, received no official notification that the services of the band were required, but being interested in the matter he wired the D.A.A.G. at Halifax. This morning he received a telegram from Col. Humphrey, which stated that there was no authority for your regimental band or any more men to proceed to Valcartier. Major Grey has been accused of employing red tape, but he is not open to any such accusation. As the officer commanding the regiment he had a right to be notified by the proper authorities if the services of the regimental band were required at Valcartier. As commanding officer, he is not supposed to pay attention to telegrams ordering out men under his command which might be received by parties having no connection with the militia. By wiring to Col. Humphrey he took the proper course in this case and the result (Continued on page five.)

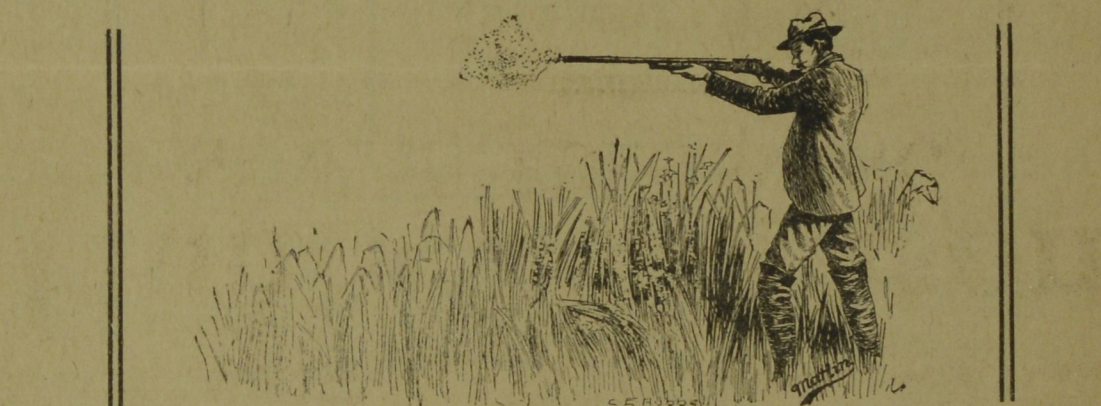
