BAND OF 71ST REGT.
MAY BE SENT TO
VALCARTIER, P. Q.

Bandmaster White Receives Orders
From Capt. Guthrie---Commanding
Officer of 71st Regt., Wires
Halifax for Information

Considerable excitement was caused in local military circles this morning over a report that the 71st Regimental Band had been ordered to Valcartier.

Inquiries being made it was learned that Bandmaster James White had received a telegram from Capt. P. A. Guthrie ordering him to enlist twenty four men from the 71st Regimental Band and the 62nd Regimental Band, of St. John, and immediately proceed to Valcartier Camp.

Major W. H. Gray, the officer commanding the 71st Regiment, arrived in the city this afternoon, and when asked regarding the matter stated he had not received orders for the band to go to Valcartier, and that nothing would be done until an official confirmation of Capt. Guthrie's order had been received from the militia authorities at Halifax.

In the meantime, however, Major Gray, had wired Halifax for the fullest information regarding the 71st Band going to Valcartier and it is expected that an official reply will reach here either tonight or tomorrow.

HITCH OVER TRANSPORTATION

Messrs. John Jones and Robert Phillips, two South African veterans, had received word from Capt. Guthrie to immediately join the 71st Regiment at Valcartier, but a hitch has occurred over the fact that Major Gray has not received authority to secure transportation for the men and they will have to remain here until further orders from Halifax.
