

A. J. Gregory,. The company has men from various parts of the province interested in it. Among others who are concerned in the enterprise are H. R. Emmerson, M. P., Albert Kitchen

and Ray Burpee.
The intention of this company which has applied for incorporation is to manufacture for commercial purposes concrete drain-pipes, waterpipes, tiles, building blocks, building ornaments, etc., The plant will be located in the old foundry building, Gibson, at the end of the Intercolonial railway bridge. Workmen are now making the necessary altera-tions to the building and the ma-chinery is expected to arrive from St. John today. The company will have a tamping machine capable of pressure of six thousand pounds to the square inch. The gravel to be used will be dredged from the bed of the mouth of the Nashwaak River. The company will have a tug boat and two scows in use and will employ a number of men.
