FILTRATION PLANT
SHOW HIGH STANDARD
OF EFFICIENCY

Records for Five Months Show Average Efficiency of 94 Per Cent Compared With 82 Per Cent Last Year

The Filtration Plant of the Fredericton waterworks, is now performing excellent service and for some time past has reached a remarkably high grade of efficiency. During the past year the plant has been severely criticized and those connected with the Water Department believe that the good work done by the plant should receive as much publicity as its occasional shortcomings. With that in view a statement comparing the efficiency of the plant for the past five months with that of the corresponding period of last year will be presented to the City Council at next week's meeting.

From November 1913 to April 1914 there has been an average efficiency of 94 per cent. For the corresponding period a year ago the efficiency was 82 per cent. During the present winter one test showed absolute perfection of filtration, a test made February 21 resulting in an efficiency of 100 per cent. For the month of March there was also a remarkably high percentage, the four tests resulting as follows:

March 5, 99 per cent.
March 23, 98 per cent.
March 21, 98 per cent.
March 31, 99 per cent.
The filters have been undergoing a cleaning this winter. The sand of two already has been washed and the washing of the third is being completed. The fourth is a new filter and does not need washing at this time.

CONCRETE BUILDERS, LIMITED, ORGANIZED HERE YESTERDAY

Plant in Gibson to be Under Operation By May 1---Wide Field Available for the Output of the Factory

Concret Builders, Limited, the new company which is to manufacture concrete blocks, etc., in Gibson, was organized yesterday at a meeting held at the Queen Hotel. The officers elected were:—

T. C. Burpee, president.
J. J. McCaffrey, secretary-treasurer.
H. J. McGrath, manager.

Additional directors, J. P. Burchill, A. J. Gregory. The company has men from various parts of the province interested in it. Among others who are concerned in the enterprise are H. R. Emmerson, M. P., Albert Kitchen, and Ray Burpee.

The intention of this company which has applied for incorporation, is to manufacture for commercial purposes concrete drain-pipes, water-pipes, tiles, building blocks, building ornaments, etc. The plant will be located in the old foundry building, Gibson, at the end of the Intercolonial railway bridge. Workmen are now making the necessary alterations to the building and the machinery is expected to arrive from St. John today. The company will have a tamping machine capable of pressure of six thousand pounds to the square inch. The gravel to be used will be dredged from the bed of the mouth of the Nashwaak River. The company will have a tug boat and two scows in use and will employ a number of men.

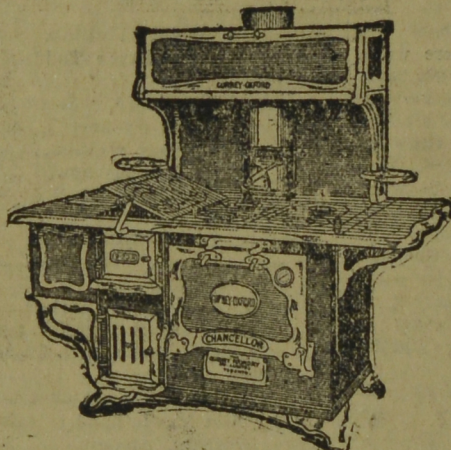

CANADIAN CAPITALISTS

88 YEARS OLD

Ottawa, Ont., April 4—John R. Booth, for more than half a century a leader in Canadian industrial circles, will celebrate his eighty-eighth birthday tomorrow, having been born April 8, 1826. Mr. Booth began his career as a bridge carpenter. Today he is rated among the richest men of Canada. In early life he removed to the Ottawa Valley and at Chaudiere Falls built the largest lumber mill on the continent. To this he added immense pulp and paper mills. He was the builder of the Canada Atlantic Railway, which he sold to the Grand Trunk in 1907 for \$16,000,000.
