## MRS. "PAT" CAMPBELL WEDS GEORGE CORNWALLIS WETS

London, April 6—George Cornwallis West was quietly married here this afternoon to Mrs. Patrick Campbell, the well-known actress, immediately after the divorce decree obtained by his wife, the former Lady Randolph Churchill, was made absolute. The decree was declared final by Divorce Court Judge Sir Samuel Evans.

An absolute decree of divorce was today granted Mrs. George Cornwallis West, formerly Lady Randolph Churchill. The first decree was granted some time ago on statutory, desertion and misconduct charges.

The former Mrs. Cornwallis West, who is a daughter of the late Leonard Jerome of New York, will be known as Lady Randolph Churchill.

Mrs. Pat Campbell and Lieut. George Cornwallis West are almost as familiar to people of this country as if they were native born. At different times in the twenty-eight years she has been on the stage, Mrs. Campbell has visited the United States and her appearance never failed to create something of a stir. George Cornwallis West was the second husband of the beautiful Jennie Jerome, who was the daughter of the famous wit, Leonard Jerome, and who as Lady Randolph Churchill, attained a standing in English society which few, if any, American-born women have ever occupied.

Mrs. Campbell is the widow of Patrick Campbell, a non-commissioned officer in the English army, who was killed in South Africa in 1900. Fourteen years before his death his wife went on the stage. For a time she was a member of some of the best known of the English theatrical companies and of late years she has been the head of her own company. She has gained her greatest fame on the stage from her emotional acting and off it because of her smart talks on the various subjects which happened to be prominently before the public at the time.

The newspapers never failed to run their interesting interviews with Mrs. Campbell on her arrival here. Besides that she kept in the public eye in many ways, whether it was on account of her Japanese dog that travelled with her everywhere or whether she was called upon to deny that she was the original of Sir Philip Burne-Jones' great picture "The Vampire," of which Rudyard Kipling wrote his famous poem.

Mrs. Campbell has two children, a son and a daughter. The son, Lieut. Alan Urquhart Patrick Campbell, married Miss Helen Bull of Chicago, in 1909.

Lieut. West was married to Lady Randolph Churchill in July, 1900. He is the son of William Cornwallis West of Ruthin Castle, at one time lord lieutenant of Denbighshire, and for many years a member of the House of Commons. Lieut. West was born in 1874, the year that young Randolph Churchill, then the rising young man of England, married Jennie Jerome.

There was some opposition to the wedding of Lady Churchill and the young lieutenant. The Prince of Wales, afterwards King Edward, was opposed to it and so was the lieutenant's sister, the wife of Prince Henry of Pless. However, these obstacles were removed. The divorce proceedings instituted by Mrs. West are recent history. Her married life had become saddened after a few years of happiness.

## POLITICAL CRISIS IN GREAT BRITAIN WAS VERY GRAVE

(Halifax Chronicle.)

That the cabinet crisis in the Old Country, which was precipitated by the incipient mutiny of the army in Ireland, was far more acute and grave than the cable despatches indicated at the time, is seen from a perusal of the English papers which have just come to hand. The London Nation, in reviewing the events of the most critical period in the life of the present Liberal government since it came into office in 1906, recalls that the effort to carry the democratic budget of 1909, raised a larger issue between the will of the people and the will of the peers. The Home Rule struggle has brought England face to face with an even greater question, the supremacy of parliament over the army. For a moment, The Nation says, it seemed that the army had triumphed and the most loyal Liberals were prepared to sacrifice the government.

The situation was saved only when the prime minister repudiated the worst sentences of Col. Seely's pledge to the striking officers of the Cavalry Brigade at the Curragh, which they regarded as a charter, extorted by their resignations, relieving them from any obligation to take part in military measures that might be necessary to enforce Home Rule. The Nation recites the facts of this "tangled and momentous crisis," which reached a climax when it appeared that the officers' strike had succeeded and that the government had renounced the use of the army to enforce the will of parliament. The feeling among Liberals, it says, was one of anger and dismay, which found vent in the vehement speech made by Mr. Ward, the Labor member, who said in the House of Commons that the question was "whether the people, through their representatives in parliament, were to make the law without interference from the King or army." The intensity of the feeling among the Liberal rank and file is indicated by the fact that Mr. Ward was acclaimed at the National Liberal Club, the headquarters of Liberalism in London, for "saying what we all think." The Nation goes on to detail how the government extricated itself and the situation was saved:

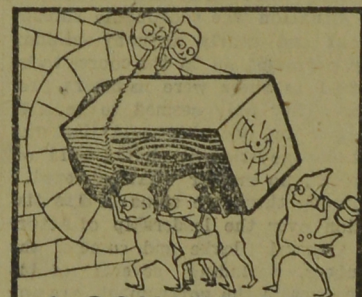
