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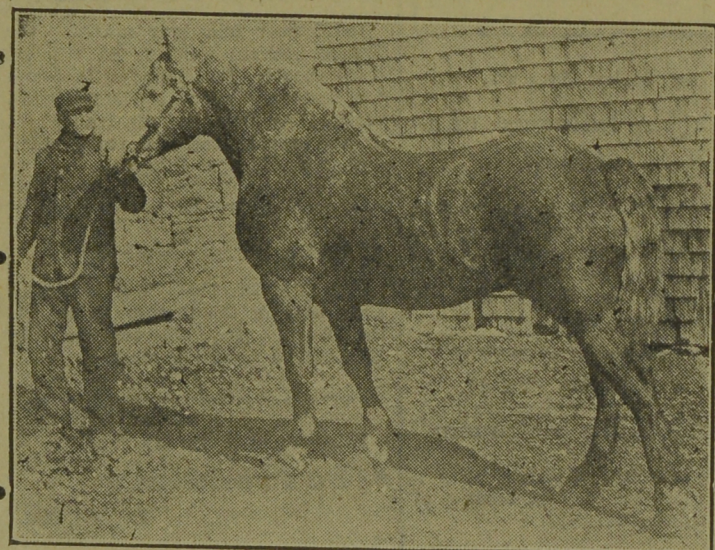

CITY LEAGUE WILL ASK CITIZENS FOR SUPPORT

Subscription List Will be
Taken Around--Reach
Baseball Goods to be
Used--League not like-
ly to Accept Offer of
Use of Trotting Park

The City Baseball League, composed of the Federals, Pets, Imperials and Todd House, met last night and considered various matters connected with the league. An offer from the lessee of the Fredericton Trotting Park to permit the league to play there on a percentage basis was received but it is not likely that it will be accepted as the majority of the clubs think this ground too far away for spectators to attend the games. A committee is now attempting to arrange for the use of the U.N.B. Athletic Field and it to report on Monday night next. It is understood that the field can be secured for a rental of twenty-five dollars.

The league last night decided to use the bylaws prepared last season with some minor amendments. It was also decided to use the Reach Baseball goods.

The league will ask for financial support from the citizens and a subscription list will be taken around shortly. The prospect is that Fredericton will have to depend this season entirely upon home-talent for baseball and the City League deserves all the support it can get.

GAFFNEY BRINGS SUIT FOR \$25,000 FOR LOSS OF PLAYER

Begins Fight With Baltimore Federals
Over Ownership of John Picus
Alias Jack Quinn

Baltimore, April 14--A duplicate of a suit brought in New York by Jas. F. Gaffney, president of the Boston National League club, for \$25,000 for the loss of Jack Quinn, whose right name is John Picus, was brought in the United States District Court today. Quinn yesterday pitched the Baltimore club to victory over Buffalo in the opening game of the Federal League season.

The suit is by its title for alleged conspiracy, but no statement of the facts relied on is given in the paper filed in court. It was brought by the Boston National League club against Edward A. Hanlon, director, and Otto Knabe, manager, of the Baltimore Federal League club; John Picus, also known as Jack Quinn, and James A. Gilmore, and the Federal League of Professional Baseball Clubs, of which Gilmore is president.

It is alleged that Quinn agreed in writing to accept terms and sign a contract with the Boston club several weeks before he signed with the Baltimore Federals. It also is alleged that after Quinn accepted a contract with Boston and it was approved by David L. Fultz, president of the Baseball Players' Fraternity he was given a check for \$3,500 by Hanlon and Knabe and signed a Federal contract, in spite of the knowledge that Quinn had accepted terms with Boston. Gilmore, it is alleged, agreed not to sign Quinn until the case was reviewed in a joint conference.

L. Edwin Goldman, counsel for the Baltimore club, said the suit is "an obvious bluff and a confession that their contract is not good in equity."

RITCHIE AND MURPHY IN GOOD TRIM

San Francisco, Cal., April 16--Unless there is an eleventh-hour postponement the twenty-round battle between Lightweight Champion Ritchie and Harlem Tommy Murphy will be pulled off here tomorrow night. For months the match between these two has been hanging fire. Several times the date for the fight has been fixed, only to be set back for some cause or another when the two fighters were almost ready to enter the ring.

Murphy is impatient for the fight to begin. Since the days of Joe Gans, the Harlem boy has been engaged in the pursuit of the lightweight title-holders. His ring record is one of the longest and most creditable of any of the present day fighters. But despite his record and his best endeavors he has never before been given an opportunity to battle for the championship. Ever since he signed up for the present match with Ritchie he has been training faithfully for the contest and he appears to be in the best possible condition.

Reports from the Ritchie camp say the champion also is as fit as a fiddle and confident of retaining his crown. If he is successful in his bout with Murphy tomorrow night Ritchie says he will make things hum among the lightweights who think they are champions. Freddie Walsh will probably be the first fighter he will take on.

The sale of seats for the Ritchie-Murphy fight indicates that one of the largest crowds for many months will see the battle.

MARITIME LEAGUE NOT HAVING EASY PROGRESS

The formation of the Maritime Baseball League is not progressing as favorable as the promoters had anticipated. Halifax has balked at the acceptance of the conditions imposed by the Moncton and New Glasgow clubs, and unless some counter proposition is suggested among these three clubs, it is feared that the league may fall flat.

As far as the St. John owners are concerned, they are willing to go ahead with the matter as it now stands, namely to play in Moncton and New Glasgow for nothing, to pay a guarantee of fifty dollars with the privilege of forty per cent. of the gate receipts to these two clubs for games in St. John, and with the agreement that Halifax and St. John give and take a guarantee of seventy-five dollars a game.

Halifax backers, however, feel that they are granting too great concessions to the other towns, and are unwilling to go into the matter on this basis. Unless Moncton and Pictou county will come out and make a compromise with the Halifax Club, the league team may not materialize.

In view of the prospects outlined to the promoter before the league meeting, it is felt that the Pictou county and Moncton clubs could easily concede something to Halifax and still come out ahead.

Henry Harding has half a dozen head at the Barton, Vt., track, with a lot more to come as soon as the weather settles.

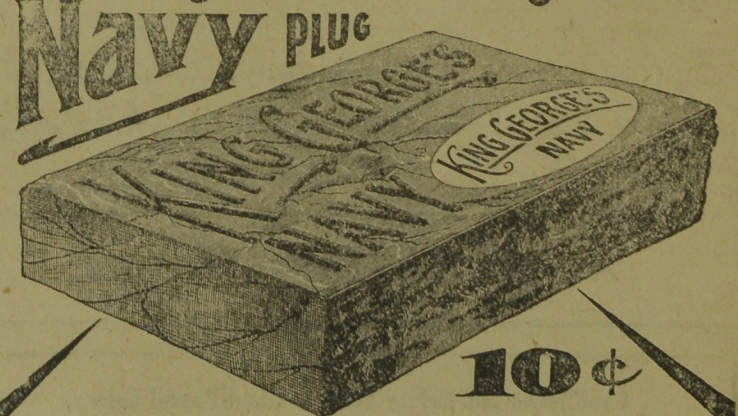
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OXFORD TRACK TEAM ARRIVES IN NEW YORK

Will Compete at University of Penn-
sylvania Meet--Englishmen Have
Very Little to Say

New York, April 15--Arnold N.S. Jackson, England's great mile runner, and three other representatives of Oxford University, arrived here today on the Olympic to prepare for the International relay race, which is to take place under the auspices of the University of Pennsylvania at Philadelphia a week from next Saturday. Norman S. Taber, formerly of Brown University, a Rhodes scholar at Oxford, is a member of the English team, but he arrived here some days ago.

The other men who accompanied Jackson today are G. M. Sproule, an Australian Rhodes scholar; D. N. Guasson, the fourth man on the team, and G. S. Robertson, a substitute. The last named pair are Englishmen.

Jackson said that they came here to run, not to talk, and when pressed for information as to the records of his team mates he said they had lots of things, including getting seasick on the trip over. When asked if he would accept an invitation to try for a record on the running track at the Harvard stadium, Jackson replied: "I would like to see the stadium, as I have heard a lot about it, but none of us is going to compete anywhere except at the Pennsylvania meet."

The visitors will remain here over night, and will leave for Providence early tomorrow, for a few days practice at the Brown University track. From there they will go to Philadelphia, where they will be guests of some of the University of Pennsylvania fraternities until after the meet and are booked to return to England on Tuesday, April 28.
