### JAMES FINNEMORE SERIOUSLY INJURED IN QUEBEC WOODS

Now at His Home Here---Both Arms Paralyzed, Head Also Affected--- Struck Tree With His Head

James Finnemore of this city, arrived home yesterday from Quebec, suffering from serious injuries sustained in an accident at St. Camille in that province several days ago. Both arms are paralyzed and the movement of his head is also impaired. He is under medical treatment and it will be several weeks before the full extent of his injuries will be known. He is able to walk but it is not yet known whether the paralysis of arms and neck is permanent or temporary.

Mr. Finnemore worked during the winter at one of the lumber camps of J. A. Morrison. In company with others employed at the camp he was driving out of the woods to Quebec City to take the train for home when the accident occurred. The sled in which he was, slewed and he struck his head against a tree which projected over the road. His scalp was torn and he suffered the other injuries mentioned. A physician was summoned to attend him, driving ten miles to the scene of the accident. After his injuries were attended to, he was taken to Quebec and brought home by railway.

His many friends in Fredericton and vicinity hope that the injuries will prove to be merely temporary.

### A. C. McNALLY'S HOUSE AT QUEENSBURY DESTROYED BY FIRE

Building Total Loss With no Insurance ---Mrs. McNally and Children in the House When Fire Occurred Saturday

A. C. McNally's dwelling at Lower Line Queensbury, was totally destroyed by fire late Saturday afternoon. Mr. McNally was in Fredericton at the time, his wife and four children being the only persons about the place. The barns fortunately, were some distance from the house, and escaped, but the dwelling with its contents was entirely destroyed. There was no insurance. The loss is placed at several thousand dollars.

As far as is known, the fire originated from a defective flue and it spread rapidly. There are no means of fighting the flames and the fire was allowed to burn itself out.

Mr. McNally is well known throughout the county and many will sympathize with him in his loss. The house was at Burgoyne's Ferry, which he has conducted for some time.

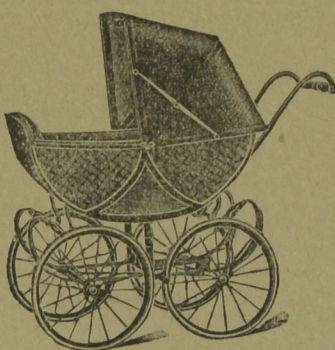

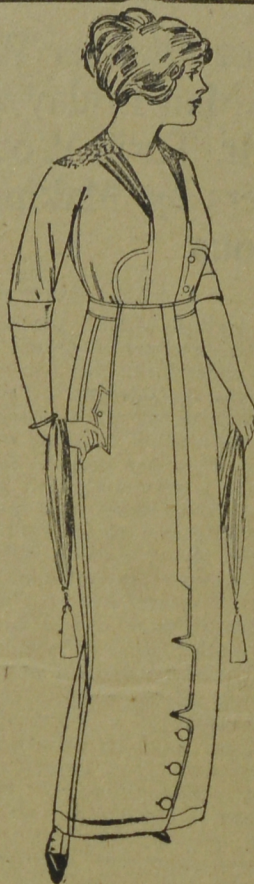

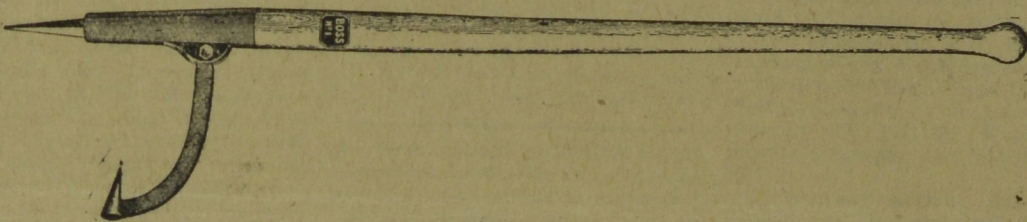
