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### NAVAL PROBLEM SOLVED

Discussing Col. Sam Hughes' scheme to utilize motor boats in connection with the militia, The Toronto Saturday Night says:

"Kurnel" the Hon. Sam Hughes has solved the naval question. The senate has refused to allow the country to aid in the naval defence of the empire by contribution; so the minister of militia has devised a scheme to overcome the difficulty. This is nothing more or less than a Canadian navy composed of motor-boats. Those who use other craft, such as canoes and row-boats, have no love for the motor-boat. They regard the latter vessels as dangerous and aggressive and have been known to curse them. The Hon. Sam has devised a means whereby the very qualities which irritate ordinary devotees of aquatic sports may be turned to defensive uses. They are to become an auxiliary to the militia of Canada in maritime, river and lake-board communities. Their owners, once they have passed an elementary examination in how to crank them up, and have proven to the satisfaction of the military authorities that they can start a motor-boat within two hours after a given time of departure, are to receive pennants and badges signifying that they are qualified auxiliaries of the Canadian militia. They will have the privilege of scouting in time of war, of carrying messages and of engaging in the transport of troops. It is not stated what measures for the arming of such craft the Hon. Sam proposes, but no doubt that will come in time.

"It is to be hoped that the honors proposed will reconcile some men to the possession of motor-boats. Many men undoubtedly own such craft but they are not pleased about it. They own them because they cannot exchange them for real estate and some do not realize that Providence permitted the invention of the motor-boat in order to chasten and discipline mankind. The impatient man who finds himself three miles from shore in a motor-boat that refuses to move receives an invaluable lesson in patience and calm endurance. He learns that curses will not move it, that bad temper is useless; that only gentle and persuasive methods will avail. But it is to be feared that too few profit by the lesson so inculcated and hold grudges against the so-called friends who unloaded these craft upon them. But make such men auxiliaries to the militia, and they will find comfort in the fact that they are rendering patriotic service; they will realize, when confronted with the ill and frailties of motor-boats are heir too, that in maintaining such craft they are in reality martyrs to their country."

Premier Flemming boasted in the Legislature this week that the potato yield of New Brunswick last year had reached a total of ten million bushels. What is there remarkable about that? In the year 1861 when the population was much less there were no railways to handle the crop and the Flemming agricultural policy was unheard of. New Brunswick was unheard of. New Brunswick according to the records, raised and marketed six million bushels of potatoes. The old reciprocity treaty was then in force and the farmers had a good market for all the potatoes they could raise. Give them the same market today and the output would soon double.

Having turned his back on the Pinder wing of the party during the recent campaign Mr. John Young M. P. P., is now gathering in his share of the spoils. He has landed the job of chairman of the agriculture Committee of the Legislature for himself and has had his son appointed coachman for the Legislature at \$4 per day.

Mr. Pinder retains his old job as Chairman of the public accounts committee. In this capacity Mr. Pinder exposed several cases of petty graft last session. His opportunities along this line are much greater this session.

Premier Flemming should look into the report now in circulation that certain public men are stockholders in the St. John and Quebec Railway Company.

together with \$255,335, received in bonus on timber licenses, making a total of over \$271,000. This amount would have been larger but owing to the financial stringency which existed during 1913, he had allowed some concessions to the lumber men.

In the receipts from mining royalties, he would point out that the Maritime Oilfields Ltd., had paid royalties on 71,328 gallons of crude oil, amounting to over \$3000. The total amount of receipts from royalties was \$13,510.

A new item in the report was that regarding oyster-culture. Under the act of last year authorizing the department to issue leases of "barren bottoms or beds," a lease had been entered into with the Canadian Oyster Company at Baie Verte. This company undertook to spend not less than \$10,000 annually for a period of seven years and after January 1st, 1920, to pay a minimum royalty of not less than \$5,000 annually. Another lease under nearly similar conditions was issued to Cysters Limited at Shemogue, extending from the western entrance of Great Shemogue to the eastern entrance of Little Shemogue, but excluding a small territory on which some oysters had been raked in the past. This company planted 2,000 barrels of oysters last fall and were to carry on more extensive operations this year.

### BIG GAME.

The report showed that the game receipts were smaller than during the previous year. The licenses issued in 1913 and 1912 were really about the same in number and the difference was accounted for by the way in which the business had been cleaned up so as to come within the fiscal year, which closed before the hunting season ended.

A few weeks ago he had had a conference with representatives of the New Brunswick's Guides Association, and he read extracts from a report of the conference, in which was a New York sportsman's letter, in which the gentleman stated that after hunting four consecutive years in the province he was convinced that the increase in the number of moose was becoming more and more rapid as the years go on. He also read the "Lamp Record" kept by Guide Arthur Pringle, and said it would be a good thing if all the guides in the province kept similar records. Mr. Pringle's record showed that he had fifteen sportsmen in the woods, not including ladies; that twelve got moose, the average spread being about fifty inches. Mr. Pringle also stated that there was no doubt that the moose was increasing every year but that caribou were not as numerous now as they were years ago.

The House adjourned at 5 p.m. until Monday at 8.30 p.m.

The Flemming Government boasts that it has done much to encourage the cause of agriculture, but its crowning achievement along this line is an appointment of Mr. John Young M. P. P., to the chairmanship of the Agricultural Committee of the Legislature. Having tried farming and made a failure of it, Mr. Young from a Flemming standpoint will qualify for the position.

In the Legislature yesterday Hon. Mr. Flemming made the rather interesting announcement that a bridge across the St. John River for use of the Valley Railway would according to experts cost in the vicinity of two million dollars.

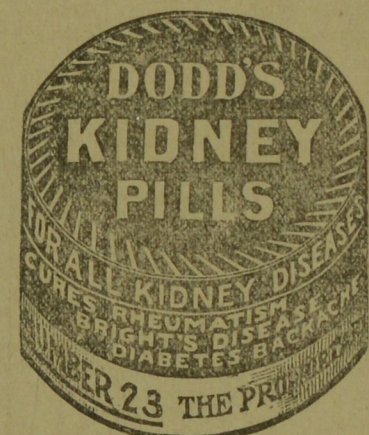

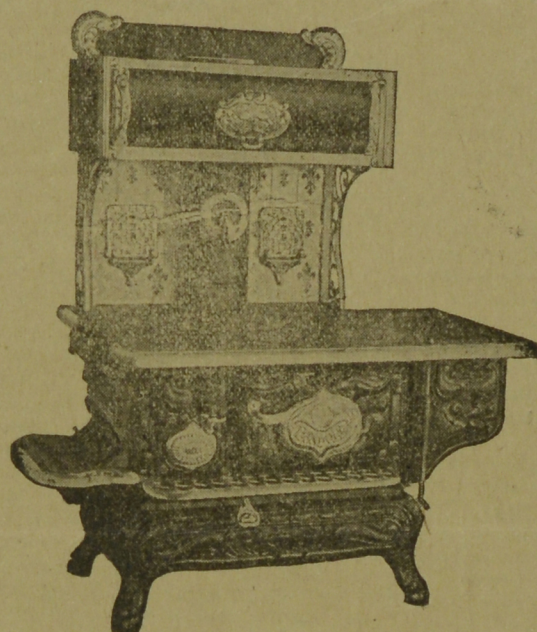
