ALLIES FORCING BACK THE GERMAN LINE

(Continued from Page One.)

portunity of resting and preparing positions from which they could resist attacks from the allies, and in which they could await reinforcements before taking up the offensive again.

FRENCH ARMIES STILL ON FLANK

The Germans are in the hilly country around Noyon, on the plateau north of Vic-Sur-Aisne and Soissons and north of Rheims, where they are digging strong entrenchments and receiving reinforcements. But even here, this right wing, which has up to the present borne the brunt of the fighting in the advance and the retreat, is not altogether safe, for the French army operating from Amiens clings to its flank, while the British and French forces continue to press in front.

It is essential, however, that they should hold their position, for they cover the lines of retreat to the north, which would be the only way out, if defeat should be their lot. That they realize this is shown by the fact that they have been contesting every foot of the ground with the allied armies, the last two days, and that both sides have suffered heavily.

The British army, as has been its lot since it landed in France, is taking its full share of this fighting, which on the front has been particularly severe, since the Germans crossed the Aisne and made their first determined stand in the retreat from Paris.

The German centre which in the last few days has come more into line with the two wings now stretch to the western foothills of the Argennes from the heights north of Rheims, the ridge, dipping a little south to touch Ville Sur Tourbe, just northeast of Camp De Chalons. This is all high, rough ground, in many places covered by heavy forest, which may by this time have been destroyed.

WOUNDED AT BORDEAUX

Among those who arrived at Bordeaux in two trains of the German wounded was a man who had a leg wine business in Bordeaux. A few days before hostilities broke out he left Bordeaux to join the German forces.

All the wounded were in a pitiable plight. Their uniforms were rags and many were without hats. The faces of all the men were black with dust and their clothes clotted with blood. Some of them were so feeble that they had to be undressed, by the Sisters of Charity, who are acting as nurses.

ZEPPELIN RAIDS

London, Sept. 16—In a statement issued tonight Sir Edward R. Henry, commissioner of police in the metropolis, expresses the hope that the restrictions placed on street and shop illuminations, as a precaution against Zeppelin raids on London, may be modified later.

But for the present, Sir Edward says, he is advised by the air department of the admiralty that it is desirable in the interests of public safety that they be continued.

CLEANSE MARNE BATTLEFIELDS

London, Sept. 16—Reuter's Paris correspondent says that eight hundred firemen left Paris today to carry out under direction of the army Medical Service such sanitary measures on the recent battlefields as will free the capital and the region roundabout from all danger of infectious diseases.

With reference to the unverified story from Berlin that on the seventh or eighth of September Emperor William forwarded a communication to the President of the United States stating that the British army on the continent was using Dum-Dum or expansive bullets, and protesting thereat as a violation of the Hague Conventions, it is interesting to find in despatches from Paris to the English papers on August twenty-third, the following:

"A further note has been sent to the Hague by the French Government protesting against the use of dum-dum bullets by the Germans. The text of the note is as follows:

"The Government of the French republic has the honour of informing the Powers signing the Hague Conventions of the following facts, constituting on the part of the German military authorities a violation of the conventions signed by the German Government on October 18, 1907:

"On August 10, 1914, after an engagement between French and German regiments, a major in the Medical Service sent to the General commanding the infantry brigade a clip of cartridges found on the Munster Road near the German Customs Office which contained five cartridges loaded with cyclindro-conical bullets out at the point, the nickel covering of which was incomplete and left exposed the fore end of the leaden core. Other similar bullets have been found in the bodies of the French dead and have been sent to the War Office. The Declaration of the Hague dated July 29, 1899, and signed by Germany, condemns the use of such bullets in the following terms: "The contracting Powers forbid the use of bullets which expand or flatten easily in the human body such as bullets with a hard envelope either does not completely cover the core or has an incision in it." The Government of the Republic protests against such proceedings."

The British Government has emphatically denied that expansive bullets have been used in the British Army during the present war; but so far as is known, the German authorities have not denied the circumstantial charges made by the French Government.

It might be explained that Dum Dum is the arsenal in India where the ammunition for the Indian Army is made and that no expansive bullets have been used in the rifle cartridges manufactured there for many years. The name Dum Dum became identified with expansive bullets on account of an issue of cartridges with bullets of that inscription turned out at the Indian arsenal for use in one of the many border wars, the object being to increase the stopping power of the small calibre cartridge when used against hordes of fanatical tribesmen. There was a violent protest aroused against the use of this ammunition in England and none of it has been issued or made since at Dum Dum.

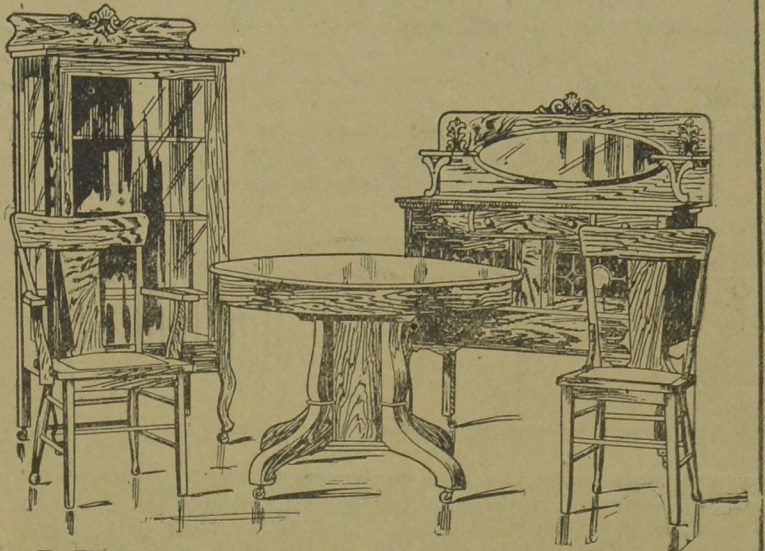
Italians Like Garters

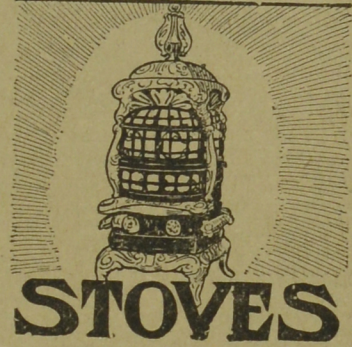
