CAN THE TITANIC BE RAISED

Proposal to Lower Around Hulk a Number of Powerful Magnets

A scheme is on fcot to raise the 'Titanic," the \$10,000,000 liner that struck an iceberg and sank with imthinks the giant boat could be brought refused. to the surface.

In some steel mills electric magnets lift masses of steel and iron weighing as much as 150 tons. Why not adapt this idea to the "Titanic?" says the engineer.

His scheme is to lower all round for \$37.50 and so got possession of the sunken vessel a large number of my first diamond. powerful magnets operated from small steamboats, one boat to each magnet. These magnets, energized by electric currents, would be forced against the side of the steel ship, and when power was applied and the cables attaching the magnets to the smaller boats wound up, the "Titanic" would be lifted clear of the ocean bed and permit divers to make any necessary repairs, pump the water out of the vessel, and get her afloat again.
