SHE LOOKS SIMPLY GRAND IN TROUSERS

New Orleans, July 24.—"The Duchess of Marlborough looks just grand in trousers, the garments you men often call 'pants'."

This is the opinion of Miss Kate Gordon, noted Southern Suffrage leader and orator, who reached her home here today, following a visit at the home of Mrs. O. P. H. Belmont at Newport, where was held a conference of many prominent suffrage leaders, and where the Duchess of Marlborough, daughter of Mrs. Belmont, exhibited the trousers—in fact, wore them. Miss Gordon declined to go into details regarding just how the Duchess looked in "pants," but here is her official statement:

"When I was in Newport they were getting ready for a Chinese ball. The Duchess has a keen sense of humor and enjoys fun as much as any one, and one day she pattered down the stairs attired in her ball costume. There was no hampering stepping in that costume, her pants—in cloth of gold, by the way—made movements easy, and she enjoyed the change of garb, and looked just grand. She walked around among us having the biggest kind of a time. She would have made a splendid looking boy."

"The Duchess of Marlborough is the most charming woman I ever met. Even if she were not the notable that she is socially, and quite aside from what wealth has done for her, she would still be a wonderful woman. She would make her mark in the world wherever she happened to find herself. She is a splendid representative of America's best womanhood."

"I was in New York," Miss Gordon said, "and was being entertained at dinner given by Speaker and Mrs. Champ Clark, when we received news of Sec. Bryan's conversion to the suffrage cause. Naturally the next thing to consider was: When will President Wilson come over to our side."

"The answer to the question is not easy, for every suffragette on the inside of the problem knows, the president will get into trouble within his own family circle whichever way he jumps."

"You see, Margaret Wilson and Jessie Wilson Sayres are suffragettes and they want the president to cast his lot with ours, but, unfortunately, Mrs. Wilson and Mrs. McAdoo are averse to our cause. So whatever happens the president is bound to 'get his' when he does his deciding and gets back into the bosom of his family."

LOAN ASSOCIATIONS ARE PROSPEROUS

Washington, D. C., July 27.—The annual convention of the United States League of Local Building and Loan Associations opened in this city today with an attendance of delegates representing nearly all parts of the country. The sessions will continue three days and will be interspersed with a trip to Mount Vernon and other features arranged for the entertainment of the visitors. Reports prepared for presentation to the convention show that the past year has been one of prosperity to the buildings and loan associations in general, gratifying gains have been made both in assets and membership. In connection with the convention of the league a meeting is being held by the National Association of Examiners, composed of officials appointed by the State governments to supervise the building and loan associations in their respective States.

THE SERBIAN AFFAIR IS LOOKING SERIOUS

the expiation of the Sarajevo murders for which Austria holds anti-Austrian conspiracies in Serbia responsible, and for guarantees of future good behavior, of the most humiliating kind ever asked of an independent nation. Ten minutes before six o'clock tonight when the Austria-Hungarian ultimatum expired, the Serbian premier handed to the Austrian minister at Belgrade Serbia's reply. The minister immediately severed diplomatic relations and started for home. The contents of the note have not been revealed, but the Serbian legation in London understands that it accepted some of Austria's conditions and rejected others. Apparently Austria was resolved to have the whole bill paid for nothing. Apparently Austria was resolved to have the whole bill paid or nothing.

The vital question to Europe is whether Russia will come to the rescue of her little Slav brother, leading to the involvement of the other powers and making the war a dread struggle of Slav against Teuton for European supremacy.

Reports from Petersburg say that the Russian army is mobilizing but it is to be remembered that Russia mobilized several corps when Austria annexed Bosnia and the German emperor stepping to the side of his ally, as was said, "in shining armor" put a veto on Russian intervention.

BELGRADE ABANDONED

Austria and Serbia are both mobilizing but the silence of all the despatches on the subject of military preparations indicates clearly that an iron clad censorship has been established in both countries. The Serbians have decided not to attempt to defend Belgrade, the garrison having already been withdrawn, according to Vienna reports, and the seat of the government has been removed from Belgrade to Kragujevac, a strong strategic point sixty miles to the south.

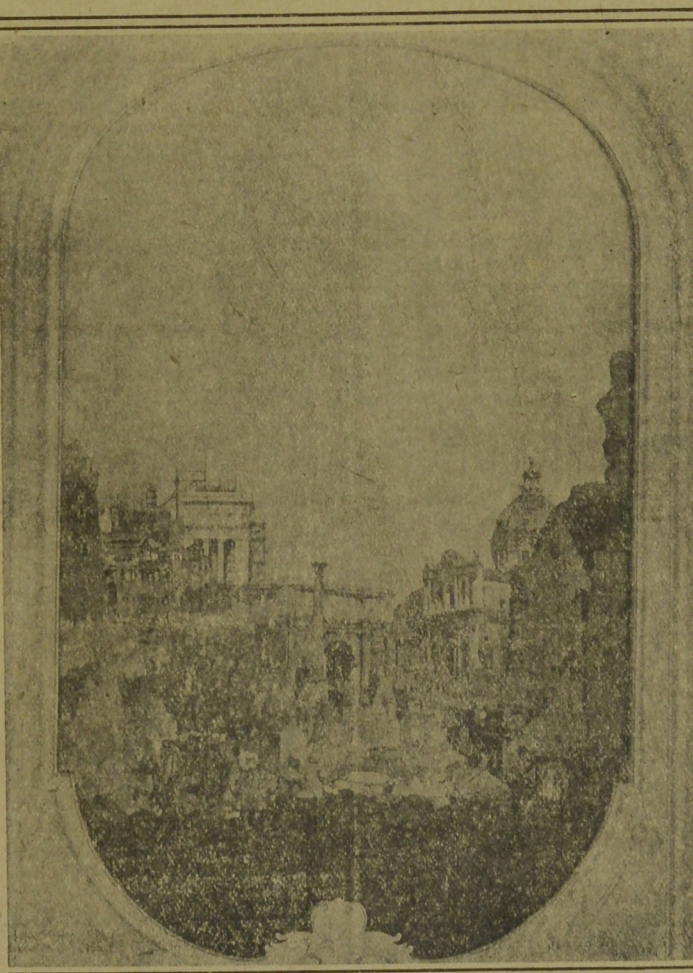
Serbia's refusal to humiliate itself to the extent that its neighbor has dictated is not unexpected. The Serbs have been in a proud frame of mind since their success in the late Balkan war and the government which yielded to such demands as Austria's could not last—even the dynasty would be imperilled. Serbia's little ally, Montenegro seems determined to cast its lot with its cousin in war.

Several partisans abroad advance the theory that Austria has made up her mind to dispose of her neighbor which has long been a thorn in her side, and has chosen a moment when the nations of the Triple Entente are handicapped by home troubles—Great Britain with a threatened civil war in Ulster; Russia with a great strike, and France with a political upheaval—to strike a decisive blow.

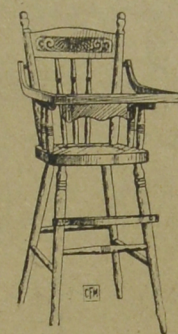

Mr. Peter J. Hughes, junior counsel for Mr. Dugal before the royal commission, spent Sunday at his home here, returning to St. John this morning.

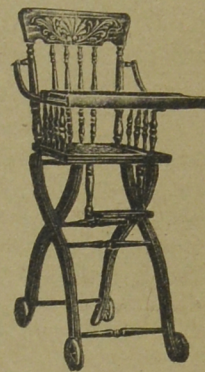


"The Forum, Rome," painted by J. Kerr Lawson, formerly of Toronto. The original is a decoration in an Italian villa.
