## HEROIC GAME WARDENS

Premier Flemming has never been put down as a humorist but if his speech on the budget was correctly reported he is a real live funny man. Speaking on Monday evening he is reported to have said: "The government would appeal to the laboring men because it had stood for a fair wage for a fair day's work. Under the old government the game wardens were paid \$1.25 a day. These were men who cruised the woods, slept beside a stump and looked after the preservation of the game, serving the whole people; and yet the old government paid them only the pittance of \$1.25 to support themselves and their families. This government had increased the pay of those men to \$1.75 and \$2 and they deserved every cent."

How did the present government deal with the men who served the old government for \$1.25 per day. In nine cases out of ten they dismissed them and appointed Tory heelers in their places. Where in rare cases a man was retained he was kept on at the old wage, while inexperienced men were paid at the rate of \$1.75 and \$2 per day. It is not necessary to go outside of York County for a concrete example. Take the case of Mr. George Stack of Harvey Station. He was a warden under the old government and is still a warden. Last year according to the Auditor General's report he was paid at the rate of \$1.50 a day while other wardens not half as good were paid \$2.

The premier's statement that game wardens "cruise the woods, sleep beside a stump and look after the preservation of the game" will bring a smile to the countenance of more than one of his supporters in York County. What are the facts? Ask any intelligent man in the country districts and he will tell you that the average game warden is a joke and a parasite. He does not go into the woods and if he did the chances are he would get lost. Why some of the men who are drawing pay in this county for alleged services as game wardens would get confused in an apple orchard.

Take the case of Mr. N. J. Smith of Fredericton who was last year paid the sum of \$100 for his services as a game warden. How many trips did he make into the woods in search of poachers? How many times did he sleep beside a stump? As he is an official of the House of Assembly it will not be difficult for the premier or any of his followers to obtain the information.

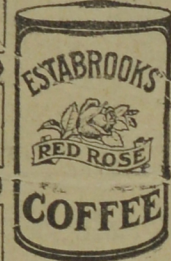
Then there is Scot Act Inspector John F. Timmins of Queensbury who posed as a game warden last year and was paid the sum of \$182. Ask any resident of Queensbury how many nights he spent in slumber beside a stump.

Take another case. There is Mr. John A. McNabb, merchant of Covered Bridge. He was a game warden last year and was paid \$156 for his services. How many nights did he spend away from his home in the discharge of his duty? How many nights did he rough it in the woods with old mother earth beneath him and the heavens over him? It is safe to say he has spent more sleepless nights trying to get the post office away from a relative of Mr. John A. Young, M.P.P., than he ever spent in protecting the game from the onslaught of poachers.

Then we have Mr. John Hurley of Green Hill, Parish of Stanley. He is a game warden and is well paid for his services but does not go into the mighty forest in pursuit of violators of the law. When Italian railway navvies were busily engaged in smar-

ing moose in the vicinity of the "Doggan" while the G.T.P. was under construction where was game warden Hurley? Possibly he may have been asleep beside a stump but he was not where he should have been.

Should the Premier want a case nearer home we can refer him to Mr. T. W. Letson of his own town of Hartland. Mr. Letson is a harness maker by trade and last year was paid \$57.75 for services alleged to have been rendered as a game warden. Just picture him leaving his business and wandering into the woods to sleep beside a stump.

Men who earn their living by the sweat of their brow will not feel under any special obligations to Premier Flemming because his government has increased the pay of game wardens. It is not laboring men who are selected for this work but men who are the direct opposite—men who have performed some service to the Tory party, and feel that laboring men and others who pay the taxes have a right to support them. If Premier Flemming would consult some of the officials of his department he would discover that the average game warden is not the hero he would have the public believe he is.

Deputy speaker Sproule tried his level best in the House on Monday evening to prevent Mr. Leger of Westmorland from replying to slanderous charges made against him by Chief Commissioner Morrissey. Hon. Mr. McLeod, to his credit be it said, came to the assistance of Mr. Leger and saw to it that he had his say.

The ratepayers of Chatham do not seem to appreciate newspaper men as town councillors. Yesterday Commodore Stewart of the World and Mr. J. Fred Benson of the Commercial who served at the board last year, appealed for reelection and both were defeated.

About the only ground on which the Flemming government can appeal for the support of the laboring men is that it paid a carpenter employed about the public buildings last year for more days than there are working days in the year.

The Quebec Legislature has been dissolved and a new election will be held on May 15th. The prime Minister Sir Lomer Guion, has given the province wise and progressive government and his triumphant return to power is assured.

Reciprocity in natural products with the United States will do more for the farmers of New Brunswick than any immigration or ready made farm scheme that the Flemming government can devise.

York County Tories who have not yet succeeded in landing government jobs should get after some of the fellows who have been favored with more than one and make them dirty up.

## ANOTHER AVIATOR KILLED

For some unknown cause his monoplane collapsed while he was flying at a height of six hundred feet and he fell to the ground and was killed instantly.
