## INTERNATIONAL LEAGUE WILL OPEN TOMORROW

Clubs Seem Evenly Matched and the Chances for Light Pennant-race are Good

New York, April 10--The International League, formerly the Eastern League, will begin its race for the championship pennant tomorrow with games in Baltimore, Providence, Newark and Jersey City. The champion Rochester team is programmed as the opponent of Fred Lake's players at Providence, while Baltimore will have the Montreal team as its guests. Buffalo will play in Newark and Toronto in Jersey City. The clubs appear to be more evenly matched this year than last, with all of the managers optimistic about their chances for the pennant. The league will play a season of 134 games, closing Sept. 22. Providence, Montreal and Jersey have changed managers since last season. Fred Lake will pilot the Providence team. Billy Lush, the old Cleveland player and Yale coach, has charge of Montreal, and Larry Schladt, former Washington player, is the new manager of the Jersey City team.

**BARROW'S STATEMENT**  
 The International League which vis with the American Association and the Pacific Coast Leagues for the leadership of the "big minors," has been much strengthened, according to President Barrow.

Discussing the situation, the President said: "I look for a very successful season in the International League. We have a well-balanced circuit, one that is but little inferior to the two major leagues. Our organization is made up of good cities where the great summer game is cherished.

"I look for very close and exciting competition on my circuit. The Eastern League was noted for its close finishes, and there is no reason to believe that a change of name should make any difference. John Gangel has won three consecutive pennants for Rochester. He has a wonderful club with which to start the progressive campaign. But he will have the time of his life beating out the field for the fourth straight time.

"There are a lot of strong clubs in the International. Joe Kelley has gathered a formidable aggregation in Toronto. Frank Navin will have the best club that has represented Providence in many years. The recruits McGraw sent to Buffalo should give George Stalling a classy club. Jersey City and Montreal have strengthened, as well as Baltimore and Newark. The race should be hot from start to finish. At the start every one of the eight clubs has a chance for the pennant. Four or five of them should fight it out all the way."

## OWEN MORAN FOUGHT DRAW WITH FREDDIE DUFFY

Twelve Rounds Were Pretty Even--American Went to the Canvas in Second Round

Fall River, April 15--In the sixth round of tonight's fight between Owen Moran, champion lightweight of England, and Freddie Duffy of Jamaica Plain, Duffy had all the chance in the world to win a reputation that would be country-wide. He had the one-time hope of the English lightweight pugilistic world in such straits that either a right or left-hand smash would have made fame for the boy from Boston, but he missed the opportunity.  
 Duffy pummeled Moran to the Queen's taste in that last two minutes of the sixth round and then fell down when he had the decision in his own keeping. The bout was one of twelve rounds and it was a pretty good draw, no decision being given from the platform.

In the second round Moran caught Duffy on the point of the jaw and the Jamaica Plain lad hit the canvas with a dull thud. He rallied however, and when he got up after the count of eight he was in good condition.  
 It was a grueling battle from start to finish. In the exchanges, Duffy more than held his own, and there were times when he came back strong with stinging right and left jabs that teased the Englishman.

In the last six rounds it was a pretty even thing, it being given and taken with about equal distribution. Moran was the stronger in the majority of the rounds. Duffy was several times in distress, but the mauling he gave the Englishman in the sixth, combined with his ability to come back in the last two periods, earned him a draw.
