THAW CASE DRAGS
ON IN SUPREME
COURT OF U. S.

Washington, Dec. 12.—Arguments were heard yesterday by the United States Supreme Court on the question of extrahiting Harry K. Thaw who escaped from Matteawan Asylum for the Insane in New York, and made his way to New Hampshire, where he was detained while the question of his extradition was being fought through the court.

The United States Court in New Hampshire granted a writ of habeas corpus and ordered Thaw's discharge from custody. The State court of New York appealed from this decision to the United States Supreme Court.

At the close of the argument, the court took the case under consideration.

Talk about the courtroom after the arguments indicated that should the court reverse the judgment of Judge Aldrich, of the Federal District Court of New Hampshire, and permit extradition, Thaw might be added to plead guilty to the charge of conspiracy as a sane person with the idea of gaining freedom by serving the maximum sentence of one year for conspiracy.

Philoander C. Knox, ex-Secretary of State, and Ex-Governor W. A. Stone, of Pennsylvania, made the argument for Thaw. Mr. Knox argued the constitutional features of the case. The State of New York was represented by William Travers Jerome and Franklin Kennedy, assistant Attorney-General.

The contention of Mr. Jerome was when a man was acquitted of a crime upon the ground of insanity, he was presumed to be insane only upon that subject.

ONE MAN'S LIFE OUTLAYS

Frenchman Spent \$10,200 on Cigars, and \$5,520 For Drinks

What the average man spends, during his lifetime, on little luxuries and trivial necessities, may seem to him but a matter of small moment. As Canadians, we have been trained to spend judiciously, nevertheless if we were to realize the colossal figures into which our little expenditures run during the course of our respective lives, we might be appalled.

An eccentric personage has just died in a town in the west of France at the age of 77. When he was 18 years of age he began to keep a book of personal expenses. For fifty-two years he jotted down every item.

During this period he smoked 628,712 cigars. Of this number 43,692 were presented to him by friends. For the remaining 581,021 he spent the sum of \$10,200.

He had bought 86 pairs of trousers which cost him \$160; 75 jackets and waistcoats, for \$330, and 63 pairs of shoes, for \$230. He used 300 shirts and 354 collars, for which he paid \$765. His omnibus and train fares came to \$260. In fifteen years he drank 23,875 bottles and 40,303 small glasses of liquor, and spent on them \$5,520, plus \$1,245 in tips.

New York, Dec. 13.—A cable to The Herald from Rome says: The Pope has received from Louvain authenticated photographs illustrating the brutalities and cruelties inflicted on Belgians by German soldiers. Other photographs indicate the irreparable damage done to the churches and public buildings.

The Pope also has received the report of a Belgian college, who was captured by the Germans and stripped and ill-treated. The Pope was greatly shocked by the report's narrative and declared emphatically that such outrages must cease.
