The three ministers, Rev. C. Flemington, Rev. H. H. Ferguson and Rev. E. E. Lake were made Honorary Presidents.

The district was divided into five sections and the following collectors appointed. Mrs. C. Flemington, Miss McAdam, Miss D. Staples, Miss L. Allan, Mrs. Joseph Smith and Mr. John Lipsett. The month of September was chosen as most suitable for collecting.

HONEY STATISTICS

Living Conditions Favorable For Beekeepers and Food Plentiful

For the purposes of reporting on the condition of bees in Ontario and the honey crop prospects blanks are sent to a large number of beekeepers by the Department of Agriculture. One thousand replies are received, on an average, from which reports are summarized.

The total number of colonies reported according to last figures is about 41,318, being an average of 32 colonies, spring count, for each beekeeper reporting. The winter loss is about 7 1/2 per cent. What losses there are during the winter are due principally to starvation caused by lack of sufficient feed in the hives.

So far as the condition of bees is concerned, the prospects for a good honey crop this year are very good but clover is only in a fair condition having been very much injured in many localities by unfavorable weather conditions.

ASSISTING WOOL-GROWERS

Sheep-raising Industry to be Further Improved and Developed

The live stock branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture is prepared to offer practical assistance to associations of wool growers in the preparation and display of their wool clips for market. Associations, in order to receive aid, must be organized in accordance with the regulations of the branch, and membership is limited to actual owners of sheep. West of Fort William an association must contain at least 3,000 sheep, or sufficient to comprise one carload of wool; east of there, a relative number. The services of expert wool classifiers, who will take charge of and perform the grading, classification and preparation of the wool, will be provided.

This proposal represents much more than a mere continuation of the work that has already been undertaken. It means the introduction of a definite scheme whereby wool producers may be actually assisted in preparing and presenting their wools upon the market in the most acceptable fashion, and thus be in a position to cater more directly to the requirements of the market. Moreover, it should prove effective in developing and improving the general status of sheep-raising and in creating an impetus to the production and preparation of an improved grade of wool and, indirectly, a better class of mutton.

GALVESTON READY FOR AUTO RACES

Galveston, Texas, July 29:—Everything is in readiness for the opening here tomorrow of what is expected to be the only automobile beach race meeting to be held in the United States this year. Seventeen events are carded for the four days' meeting. Tomorrow's programme is to include the first leg of a 150-mile race which is to be run in three legs, fifty miles each day, with a limit of one hour placed upon the first two installments.

For this event \$1,500 will be awarded as first prize, \$750 for second, \$300 for third, \$200 for fourth, and in addition to these \$100 will be awarded each car finishing first in its class, making a total of \$3,250 prize for the one race. There will also be a mile trial free-for-all flying start in an attempt to lower the beach record of 31.11 held by Louis Disbrow in a Jay Eye-See. A fifteen mile 301-450 cubic inch class race and a ten mile, 231 and under, will complete the first day's programme.

RIFLE CHAMPIONSHIPS

Winnipeg, Man., July 28:—With the largest number of entries ever recorded here, the Provincial rifle championships opened at the ranges this morning. Manitoba is noted for her marks men and practically all the best shots are taking part in the competitions. The tournament will continue until Saturday.
