Centreville and then I was in Boston
trying to get my hearing better.

Q.—You had a good time in Bos-
ton; did you meet Bill Berry there?

A.—I did not.

Q.—Why did you go to Boston?

A.—Who, me?

Q.—Yes.

A.—I went to see about my hearing.

Q.—Did Mr. Flemming ask you to
go to Boston?

A.—No, sir.

Q.—You went entirely on your own
motion?

A.—Yes.

Q.—And then returned to Wood-
stock. How long were you there?

A.—Two days.

Q.—Got back on Friday and left on
Monday morning?

A.—Yes.

Q.—Did you see me there at that
time?

A.—I think I saw you at Lakeville
on Sunday.

Q.—But not on a week day?

A.—No.

Q.—And next Monday morning you
went away?

A.—Yes.

Q.—Did you see Mr. Flemming when
you were in Woodstock?

A.—I did.

Q.—On what day?

A.—On the Saturday. I would not
be positive about it.

Q.—Where did you see him?

A.—At his brother's.

Q.—Is that near your office?

A.—Yes, it is just across the way.

Q.—Before you left the brother's
did anyone tell you to go away again?

A.—No, sir.

Q.—Didn't someone tell you that
you had better go away again?

A.—No.

Q.—Didn't Mr. Flemming or Mr.
Flemming's brother tell you you had
better get away again?

A.—No, he said the work would be
all right in about a week.

Q.—Did not they ask you to go to
Nova Scotia?

A.—No, sir.

Q.—Did John Flemming ask you to
go to Nova Scotia for a week?

A.—No, I don't know that he did.

Q.—Was not something said about
it?

A.—They said the work would start
in another week.

Q.—But nothing about your going
away?

A.—The brother may have. I did
not have much to say about the con-
tract of that sort of thing.

A HARD JOB.

Q.—I have had a pretty hard job to
get you here, have I not?

A.—(With a chuckle.) I guess you
have.

Q.—And you did not come of your
own free will?

I did not.

Q.—Did I not subpoena you in June?

A.—That is a question. The name
on it was John Doe.

A.—I gave it to you in June myself
and told you that I wanted you to

Teed, the witness was asked if he had

Mr. Carvell said that Mr. Mac-
Donald, the bookkeeper for Kennedy
& MacDonald, was in the city and
could be called to prove the contents
of the package if there was any ques-
tion about the amount.

Mr. Teed—We do not know. Mr.
Flemming may have received the
package and passed it on to the
treasurer without counting it.

Mr. Carvell (significantly)—He
may have.

CHARLES K. HOWARD.

Charles K. Howard, called and ex-
amined by Mr. Carvell, said he was
the right-of-way agent for the Valley
Railway and had been since January,
1912. John Connor worked with him
and Patrick Corbett had worked for
a short time at intervals amounting
to about four months.

Q.—I want you to tell me what
solicitors were employed in connec-
tion with the railway matters.

A.—J. C. Hartley of Woodstock, J.
R. Dunn of Gagetown, Percy A. Guth-
rie of Fredericton, H. F. McLeod of
Fredericton, D. K. Hazen of St. John's
and S. M. L. Hayward of Hartland.

Q.—Anyone in Victoria county?

A.—No, not unless Mr. Carter has
been doing something. (Laughter.)

Then I had the advice of J. B. M.

Baxter in one case.

Q.—You forgot J. N. W. Winslow.

A.—Yes, I did forget him.

Q.—Was there any other among the
faithful in Woodstock or Carleton?

A.—I might mention you, you got a
share, though I don't know whether
you are among the faithful. (Laugh-
ter.)

Q.—You don't mean to say that
you would employ me—

A.—Not if I could help it. (Loud
laughter.)

Q.—Well, I got it in spite of you.

A.—Yes.

Mr. Fowler—Is this charged to
right-of-way?

A.—Yes.

Q.—What proportion of the right-
of-way do you say is now adjusted?

A.—I have an estimate made some
time ago.

Q.—Does the estimate include the
cost of two miles at Fredericton?

A.—No, it does not.

Witness then stated that it would
require \$36,000 to square the right-of-
way between Centreville and Gage-
town. The amount asked for in arbi-
tration was \$21,000. When an item
for a station at Fredericton was
mentioned by the witness, Mr. Car-
vell said he could not see why the
province had been asked to pledge
its credit to build a station there as
there was already a good one. Wit-
ness said they would want terminals
there.

After replying to some questions in
regard to land purchases at Wood-
stock the witness was asked about
the item in the right-of-way book in
the name of the New Brunswick and
British Colonization Company, to
whom \$500 was paid in April, 1913.

Witness said it was a land or real
estate company with headquarters in
St. John and the purchase was for a
piece of land at Fredericton for a
station.

"We are in hopes of having a union
station in Fredericton and it will be
the finest in the province."

Q.—Have you not the I.C.R. sta-
tion?

A.—Yes, it was built for election
purposes. But it never worked out.

Q.—But it is there and is it not big
enough for a city like Fredericton?

A.—No, it is about the size for a
suburban town.

Mr. Carvell—If anyone can tell me
why they should squander \$100,000 on
building another station for a small
town, I cannot understand it.

Mr. Guthrie—Fredericton is not a
small town.

Witness—There are five different
railways coming into the town and
we are entitled, I think, to build a
station.

Q.—Well, you paid \$500 for build-
ing plots which you think ought to be
used for station purposes?

A.—Yes.

Q.—And you are to pay \$3,500
more?

A.—Yes.

The royal commission then ad-
journed until ten o'clock this morn-
ing.

MADAME CAILLAUX

FREED BY JURY

Paris, July 23—Madame Caillaux,
wife of M. Caillaux, former premier
of France, has been acquitted of the
murder of M. Calmette, editor of The
Figaro. The jury retired at 8.40 p.
M., Paris time, tonight, and after a
short absence brought in a verdict of
"not guilty."

Demonstrations against the Caill-
aux verdict occurred in several plac-
es tonight. In the boulevards the ex-
cited crowds discussing the merits of
the case grew to large proportions,
and when the jury's verdict became
known there were shouts of derision,
and cries of "down with Caillaux."

After dining at home with her
husband and a few friends, Mme.
Caillaux, attired in a handsome even-
ing gown, received a number of inti-
mate friends.

"It is Maître Labori," she said, "to
whom I owe the good fortune to be
pennally free. He pleaded today with
all his fine talent and I am profound-
ly grateful to him."
