HOULTON TUESDAYCut Three Seconds off Her Record---
Maine Horses Won the Other
Two Events

Houlton, Me., July 28—The second meeting of the Aroostook short circuit was run at Houlton today before a crowd of about 1,000 people. The racing was clean throughout, but a little scoring except in the second heat of the trotting race, when ten scores were necessary to get any-like a good start.

The features were the hard racing duel between the pacers Thomas S. and Hard Luck, the former was driven in masterly style of George Reed of Fort Fairfield, while Hard Luck was handled by the experienced driver, Campbell, a former grand circuit driver. These horses gave an exhibition of gameness seldom seen on the half-mile rings. Three of the four heats were very close. In the final young Reed had all the best of it from the seven-eighths pole home.

It was Homeland at all stages of the game in the 2.19 pace. It was supposed that Allie would win, the fight being for second money between Homeland and Maine Pointer, old rivals in the game down in Maine. It was all off, however. The Allie mare was not up to the job lined out for her, and Maine Pointer while she put up a gamy fight three trips better than eighteen, two of them in 2.16, was a trifle stiff for her.

Mont Gerow surprised the talent with the Chestnut mare Flora P. She has won a couple of red rags in her earlier races for him. Today she went a good race pulling down third money and the last heat looked like she could go faster if asked.

Homeland is a bay gelding by the dead sire Wilkes 8571, Maine's best sire. He was owned up here for a year and with a record of 2.19, supposed to be outclassed. Pottle bought him, gave him his style, and the now trims the gang in one of the best races of the year.

The race in the trot was easy for the big mare from Fredericton, Sharon, winning by stretch drives in the three heats the last heat in 2.18, cut her record three seconds.

After a brilliant winning streak at home the Chicago White Sox cracked badly on their eastern trip.

Halifax Races Have
Big List of EntriesKING COUCHMAN
WON 2. 13 PACE IN
CHAMBER OF COMMERCEGrand Circuit Races at Detroit all
Were Won in Straight Heats
Yesterday

Detroit, Mich., July 28—Dick McMahon today won his second \$5,000 stake of the year when he drove King Couchman to an easy victory in the Chamber of Commerce stake for 2.13 class pacers, the event of chief interest on the Grand Circuit programme. In marked contrast to yesterday's splendid contests, all the races today were won in straight heats.

Bel Direct and Grand Opera were close up to King Couchman nearly all the way in the first heat of the Chamber of Commerce. Entering the stretch Thistle Patch came from behind with a fine show of speed to get second place from Bel Direct. The first four horses were lengths apart at the wire. In the second heat Thistle Patch was the contender all the way but never had a chance to get along side the flying King Couchman. The clip in the last half of this mile was too hot for the majority of the starters and only six of the original thirteen were left for the final heat, which King Couchman won in 2.05, the fastest time of the race. He had plenty in reserve and had he been extended would have done considerably better. A stiff wind which the horses had to break on the back stretch prevented record time being made.

The 2.05 pace was little more than exercise for William. He was always in front and never had to be forced.

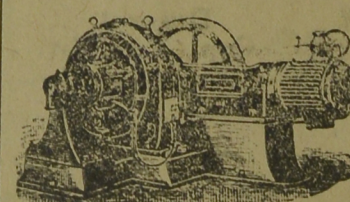

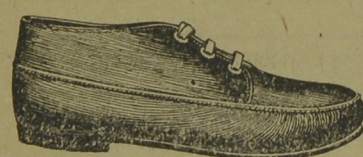

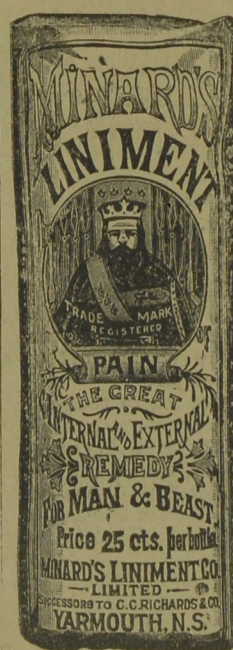
