IMMIGRATION DEPT. INQUIRES RE UNEMPLOYED HERE

Conditions in and About Fredericton
Are not Bad--Few Unemployed in
in City--Less Railroad Con-
struction Than Formerly

The local office of the Dominion Immigration Department this morning received a telegram from Ottawa asking for information concerning the number of unemployed in Fredericton. The query is in line with others sent to various parts of Canada where the problem of unemployment is more serious than it is in the maritime provinces. In some places, particularly in the west, where there is a large foreign-born population, steps are being taken to deport some of the unemployed.

There is reported to be little unemployment here. It is said those who are not employed are either unable to secure work of the kind they want or else are of the casual labor class. There is said to be the average amount of building going on about Fredericton and those following the building trades have no trouble securing employment. Agricultural labor is also in demand at the present time. There has been, however, a falling off in the amount of railroad construction in this vicinity and as a result of that there are a number of foreign laborers idle in Fredericton. Some of the men who had been working at construction and other branches of railroad building have left this part of the country and others are to follow.

The C.P.R. is said to be the barometer of railroad activity and at present that road is not undertaking any extensive work. Some men have been laid off by this road in various of its departments.

GOVERNMENT TO REPAIR DAMAGE BY CLOUDBURST

George B. Jones, M. P. P., Appeared
Before it Last Night in That Con-
nection--Hydro Electric Com-
pany Matters

The Provincial Government met here last night and will continue in session till tonight when it is expected that the schedule will be finished. Hon. George J. E. Clark acting premier arrived last night together with Hon. D. V. Landry and Hon. J. E. Wilson.

George B. Jones, M.P.P., was before the government last night making an appeal on behalf of the people of the Millstream Valley in King's County where tremendous damage was done by a cloudburst a short time ago. Mr. Jones pointed out that the highway in places had been washed out to the depth of ten and twelve feet in places and bridges also had been destroyed. Hon. John Morrissey, Minister of Public Works is to attend at once to this matter as it is in his department. Everything will be done to repair the damage done by the storm as soon as possible.

This morning Percy W. Thomson of St. John interviewed the government with regard to matters concerning the New Brunswick Hydro-Electric Company. According to legislation passed last session additional capitalization is to be allowed the company on the passing of an order-in-council by His Honor the Lieutenant Governor. Mr. Thomson is here in that connection and will be before the government again this evening.

George A. Perley, M.P.P., for Sunbury is in the city today and had a brief interview.

His Honor the Lieutenant Governor accompanied by J. M. Palmer of Sackville arrived here by automobile last night. He came up the St. John Valley.



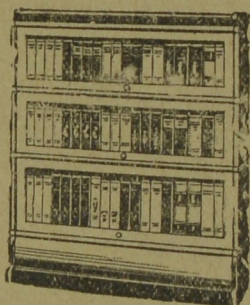

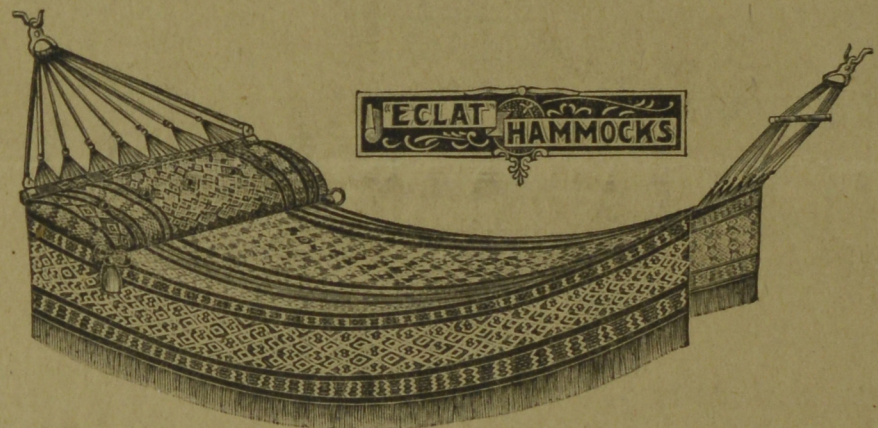
