July 4 Placed as Date for Blowing up of Weak Organizations—Some of Smaller Leagues are Putting up Good Contests and Playing to Big Crowds

New York, June 6—Pre-season dope conveyed the information that the present season was bound to be a bloomer for the minor league clubs financially. The principal reasons advanced for these pessimistic prognostications were the Mexican situation and the appearance of the Federal League. It was considered certain that chatter on the war below the line would be more interesting to the bugs than baseball, but if any of the minor league clubs managed to survive the loss of business suffered on this account they must eventually succumb to the Federal League and its policy of grafting the stars from the little fellows without the formality of passing over any money.

Notwithstanding these dire predictions of disaster, there are now more minor league clubs doing business than there were at this time last year. In the past it has been the rule that July 4 was "blow-up" day for all woody organizations in minor league baseball. Some of the leagues may "blow" during the same and safe festivities this year, but at the present time they are all doing business at the old stand and in the most of the circuits they are giving the fans a good run for their money.

GOOD PERCENTAGES.

In taking a slant at the percentages of the different minor leagues quite a number of surprises will greet the eye. Beginning with the big minors, or Class AA organizations, it is seen that the champion Newark team is up against it in the International League, while Indianapolis, a former cellar champion, is beating or bruising everything in the American Association. The Pacific Coast League, the third member of the AA class, is putting up a great race, with Venice and Los Angeles showing the way.

In the Class A leagues, New Orleans a hopeless case last season, is setting the pace in the Southern League, and in the Western League St. Joseph, Sioux City and Lincoln are giving the three-time champion Denver team a real battle for the pennant.

Descending the line, Pat Flaherty's Lynn team, an outfit that hadn't been heard from in years, is found tying up the New England League race. Troy is out in front in the New York State League struggle and Dayton, two hundred points ahead of the second team, is running wild in the Central League. In the Canadian League Ottawa and London look to have the edge, with the other teams all set and ready to jump forward should the leaders crack. In the Carolina League the Charlotte Hornets are worrying the champion Winston-Salem outfit.

OTHER SMALL LEAGUES.

The pennant-winning Oshkosh team again is showing the Wisconsin-Illinois teams how the old game is played and Chillicothe, another champ of 1913, is up among the best fellows in the Ohio State League chase.

The fast work of the leading Norfolk team is making Virginia League fans sit up straight, while Petersburg last year's pennant winner, is struggling to keep out of the basement. The Savannah team looks to be pinned to the cop the pennant in the South Atlantic League again this year. The Georgia State League is staging a corker race with every team in the circuit having a chance.

That Davenport has some team is shown by a glance at the Three-I League standing. Davenport will have to be sat on (joke) pretty soon or the old Three-I boys will look bent from being so top-heavy.

Grand Forks and Winnipeg have been cleaning up in the Northern League and Battle Creek and Bay City look to be the two outfits the Southern Michigan League teams will have to beat in order to win the honors. The champion Houston team is holding its own in the Texas League, with Beaumont, a tail-ender last season, showing considerable class. Texarkana and Denison look to be the strongest contenders in the Texas-Oklahoma League race and Owensboro, Paducah and Henderson seem to have a little something on the other teams in the Kitty League.

The champion Vancouver team is making the other Northwestern League teams step lively, while Ogden of the Union Association, and Saskatoon of the Western Canada League are the bright scholars in their respective circuits.

Both the California State and the Western Tri-State Leagues are putting up air-tight races. Burlington is away out front in the Central Association and still going strong. Every team in the Tri-State League appears good enough to land the flag with the possible exception of York.

The Newark Cubans, last year's pennant winners, are again proving to be hard birds for the Atlantic League teams to bag. Of the new minor leagues organized this year, the Colonial League, Interstate League, Pennsylvania-West Virginia League and Oklahoma League, all of them are running along smoothly and expect to have a prosperous season.
