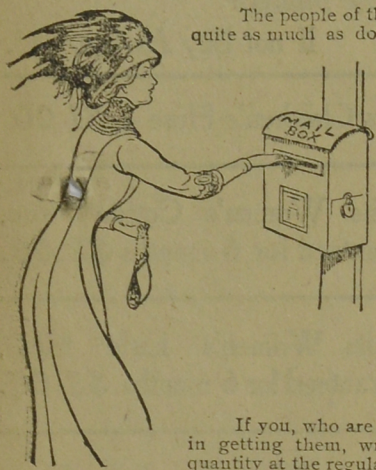

AGENT FOR MARITIME HOME FOR GIRLS COMING HERE

Rev. V. M. Purdy, B. D., Soliciting Funds For Proposed Protestant Home

The Rev. V. M. Purdy, B.D., financial agent of the Maritime Home for Girls, who has just completed a two weeks' campaign in St. John, has arranged to visit Fredericton next week. It is gratifying to know that the general public is recognizing the wisdom of providing such a home and is supporting it financially.

The home is for delinquent Protestant girls. The Roman Catholics have institutions for their boys and girls but no Protestant institution yet exists within the Maritime Provinces for girls. Whilst the home will be directly under the joint auspices of the Methodist and Presbyterian churches, it will be a Protestant home on broad non-sectarian lines. The Baptists will deal officially with the matter at their forthcoming conventions but their executive committee warmly endorses the project and commends it to their people for moral and financial support. The bishops of Nova Scotia and Fredericton will submit the matter to their synods and personally favor the movement and urge their people to support the same.

The governments of the three Maritime Provinces have passed legislation making a grant for each girl committed to the home and no appeal will be made for running expenses. The initial cost of about \$3,000 must be raised by subscription and Mr. Purdy is visiting the provinces for the purpose of raising this amount. For years the need of such an institution has been keenly felt and it is believed that the Protestants of the Maritime Provinces will respond to the appeal to establish this home. It has been decided to establish the home at Truro, N.S.

Mr. Purdy will speak in St. Paul's church on Sunday morning, in the Methodist church Sunday evening and address a mass meeting in the Y.M.C.A. Hall on Monday evening at eight o'clock.

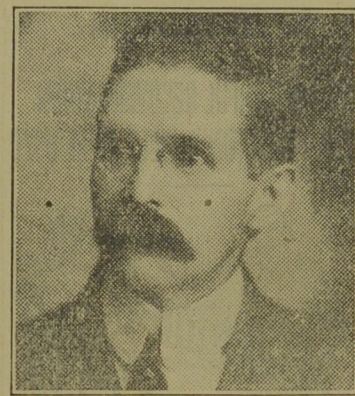
to be celebrated Thursday in the British embassy chapel in Madrid.

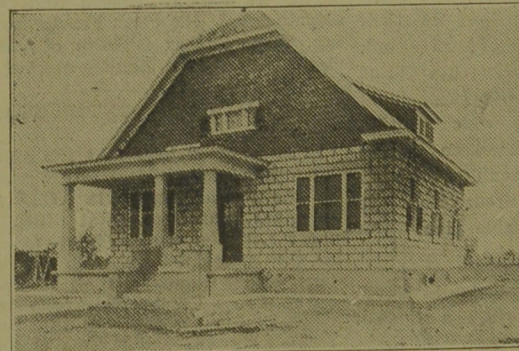
