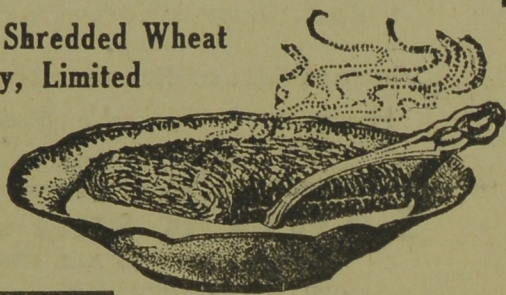

STENOGRAPHERS—Miss Marion Risteen and Seth H. Berry of this city, were among the candidates examined in St. John on Tuesday for the position of court stenographers.

WEDDING ANNIVERSARY—Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Weddall celebrated the twentieth anniversary of their wedding on Monday evening last. A number of their friends were present.

WENT IN CANOES—S. G. Ritchie, B.A.; F. B. Green and B. R. Armstrong of U.N.B., started in canoes yesterday for their homes in St. John. They expect to arrive about Tuesday.

FAST TRAIN—Commencing Monday, June 8th, the C.P.R. Fredericton express will leave Fredericton at 6 a.m. standard time and arrive in St. John at 8:20 a.m. standard time.
