LOGS WENT ADRIFT.

The gale yesterday afternoon broke the boom at the mouth of the Nashwaak, which was holding lumber belonging to the Partington Company. Some of the logs went adrift in the main river, but the damage was repaired and the most of the lumber held.

AROUND THE MARKET.

There was a fair sized market this morning but the variety of produce offered for sale was not large. Potatoes in small quantities sold for \$1.50 per barrel, spring lamb brought from \$1 to \$1.50 per quarter. Veal sold at 8 and 10 cents, beef at 9 and 10 cents, and pork at 13 cents. Butter sold at 25 cents and eggs at 20.

ACADIA'S NEW RESIDENCE.

The Rhodes, Curry Company have been given the contract to erect a new residence to replace the building burned at Acadia University, Wolfville, last week. Work was commenced on Saturday. The structure will be of brick and three stories high, to accommodate sixty students, and is to cost in the vicinity of twenty-six thousand dollars.

CLAIMS SCOTTISH FORTUNE.

CORPORATION DRIVE TO
BE IN MONDAY

River Rose Six Inches as Result of Recent Rain—Upwards of 35,000,000 Feet in Booms—Rafting Begins Monday

The first drive on the lower corporation limits is expected to be into the booms above this city on Monday next. The water has remained at a good height and rapid progress was made with the drive. On the upper section, from Grand Falls to Woodstock, the first drive was in some time ago. Subsequent driving will depend upon the speed with which logs are sent through the sorting gaps at Van Buren.

The recent heavy rain brought the river here up about six inches. Prospects for driving the remaining logs to the booms are particularly bright. Prospects for rafting are also good. At the Douglas boom rafting is to begin on Monday next.

A. V. Rowan, boom manager for the St. John River Log Driving Company, estimates that the booms above Fredericton now contain between 35,000,000 and 40,000,000 feet of lumber. This quantity will be added to from time to time as other lumber comes from up river.

POTATOES FROM
UNITED STATES IN
TORONTO MARKET

Freight Rate on New Brunswick Potatoes so Great That Advantage of Duty is Overcome—Uncertainty Among Shippers

Ex-Ald. W. W. Boyce, a prominent produce shipper of this city, yesterday received word that potatoes from the United States had come into the Toronto market in such quantities that the market had become disorganized and the buyers are very uncertain as to what course to pursue.

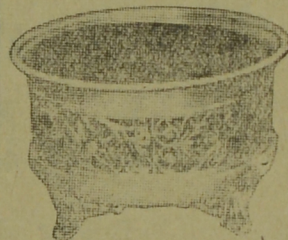
This is liable to affect local prices, as the Toronto market is what has been taking exports from this place during the past spring. The price this morning paid by shippers was \$1.50 per barrel. It is expected to fall as the result of the word from Toronto.

Canada imposes a duty of twenty cents per barrel upon potatoes from the United States, but the freight-rate charged on potatoes shipped from Fredericton to Toronto is so high that the advantage given by the duty is lost to the local shipper.

The Upper Canadian market has been loudly proclaimed to be an efficient substitute for that in the United States, but it has its disadvantages and many of them. The present situation well illustrates the fact.
