LASSIE MCGREGOR WON  
THE M & M AT DETROITRace Went Seven Heats--Linda Wrona got the Flag  
After Making Great Effort--Flower Direct Won  
Free-for-all in Five Heats--Bad Mix-up in This

Detroit, July 30—Lassie McGregor, owned by Henry Oliver of Pittsburgh, and splendidly driven by Tommy Murphy, today won the seventh and deciding heats of the Merchants and Manufacturers' stake, which was carried over from yesterday, after six heats had been run off. Linda Wrona was left far outside the flag, and so failed to get any part of the prize, in spite of her great performance of yesterday, when, in winning the second heat, she set a new mark of 2.05½ for the stake.

While the decision of the M. and M. held the chief interest, the free-for-all pace, won in five heats by Flower Direct, furnished the sensation of the day's Grand Circuit programme. In the first heat of the race, Directum I. led for half a mile. Then Earl Jr., rushed around the field into first place. Bunching up as they reached the three-quarters, Earl Jr., broke and swerved in front of his field. There was a bad mix-up. Cox was thrown from his seat, his horse Delrey, running away. A tire was torn from Earl Jr.'s sulky, while Hal B., Jr.'s machine was smashed. Delrey stopped after passing the grand stand and neither horse nor driver was injured.

Directum I. led all the way in the second heat, but Flower Direct took the next three.

The Resignation of the Blind  
How is it, asks a writer in "Cornhill's Magazine," that the blind as a whole look and appear to be happy? It is for the reason that their affliction is so entirely hopeless, so utterly absolute in its deprivation, that it compels them to see the uselessness of rebelling against the inevitable. It is the knowledge that moroseness and impatience will only aggravate their misery; it is the fight with themselves, once mastered, that causes them to see the matter in the right light. When that is accomplished a new life is opened up to them, a fresh start is made—as it has to be—the outlook becomes brighter and everything has to be relearned, so that they may gain their ends without the use of vision. This it is that gives them occupation and brings contentment, but do not imagine that, however they may look or appear, they forget for one moment their affliction or their longing and desire to see. That is ever present and their life is merely patient endurance, with the desire to prove as little burden as possible to their more fortunate fellows.

Prolific Cattle Tick  
A male and a female tick hatched in April may by Oct. 15 give rise to 6,750,000,000 descendants, about half of which, being females, will lay about 1,500 more eggs apiece immediately or the following spring.

Take the cattlemen's point of view. A thoroughly, although not exceptional infestation may carry away a hundred thousand calves at one time and, during one season, may be infected by four such broods. Now, 150 ticks, after having engorged the calf for three or four days, will weigh about a pound, this representing almost entirely the weight of the blood taken from the host. Thus the helpless beast may actually lose from 20 to 30 pounds of blood in a single season.

RIOT ATTENDED  
BALL GAME IN  
DETROIT THURSDAYUmpire Sheridan Ordered Ainsmith  
and Morgan off the Field After  
They Had Assaulted Him

Detroit, July 30—One of the most disorderly scenes ever witnessed during the ninth inning of today's game between Washington and Detroit, which the locals won, 3 to 2, in the tenth inning.

The riot started when Morgan was called out at first base by Umpire Sheridan. In recovering himself from a slide he started toward the umpire. Sheridan struck Morgan and several Washington players joined in the argument. Catcher Ainsmith is said to have struck Sheridan, who was being held by several players from both teams.

Sheridan ordered Ainsmith and Morgan off the field and as the two players were passing the grandstand, a spectator said something which Ainsmith resented. He jumped into the stand and blows were exchanged. Catcher Henry attempted to pull Ainsmith from the stand and a chair thrown by a spectator struck Henry on the head. The crowd from the bleachers and grandstand then rushed onto the field and across to the scene of the row. Police reserves had been hurriedly summoned. They took charge of the situation and after considerable difficulty succeeded in driving the crowd back into the seats and play was resumed.

Covelski was invincible after the first inning and struck out eleven men. A wild pitch by Shaw in the tenth inning with the bases filled allowed the winning run to be scored.

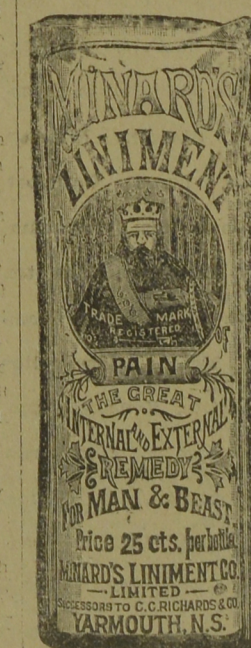

In an editorial comment on the New Brunswick revelations the Saskatoon Phoenix says:

Hon. J. K. Flemming may have believed that the fund raised for his party purpose was by voluntary subscription but if so he must have been a veritable lamb in a pack of wolves. Nobody else seems to have been possessed of much innocence.

The sworn testimony of Contractor John Kennedy that the Premier asked for a contribution and was personally paid \$2,000 cannot, by any stretch of the imagination be construed into a voluntary contribution. What the Premier of the province asks in the way of political favor from a contractor on a public job is as good as a command. Hon. Mr. Flemming may have done any what various predecessors did. Let us hope not, but even if they did hold up contractors they were able enough, or fortunate enough to escape being found out. That of itself is to their credit. The story told by Mr. Kennedy makes it still more clear that the usefulness of Hon. Mr. Flemming as a political leader is gone. His retirement should be insisted on by his party if it has any hope or expectation of retaining public confidence. Hon. Mr. Clark or some other should at once be called to assume control of provincial affairs.

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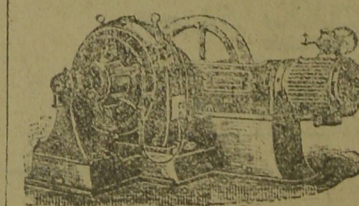
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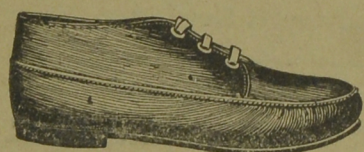
