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WOULD EMPOWER MAGISTRATE IN ELECTION CASES

Ottawa March 16.—Mr. J. P. Burnham, M. P., for West Peterboro expressed his views today before the electoral purity committee. His main argument was in favor of such changes in the law as will expedite the prosecution and summary connection of those guilty of offences under the Act.

"If we can attain our object in cases of common or aggravated assault," he said, "why not in election matters. Local magistrates should have jurisdiction in these cases. Give them summary power and you will raise the dignity of office."

"When a man is robbed he complains but not so when \$5 or \$10 is thrust upon him," suggested Mr. A. K. MacLean. "What about having election day a public holiday?" was asked of Mr. Burnham "It is a tip-top idea especially as the working classes want it." "Would you favor having it on Sunday?" asked Mr. MacLean.

"There is no more sacred trust than voting and Sunday would be a fright for election day."

"The Lord's Day people would object," suggested Mr. Carvell. "They are very eminent but not practical," was Mr. Burnham's comment.

"I summarize my views," said the West Peterboro member "by holding that local magistrates should have

summary powers in election offences. I believe that if we increase the powers of the country justices, they will not fail to appreciate such powers. They may have been cut-throats before, but they will be judicial once on the bench, we should end this system whereby certain people are marked down as purchasable and are bought. The machinery should be summary."

AGAINST THE MAGISTRATES.

"My experiences with the county magistrates," said Mr. Carvell "is that in a civil action they are attorneys for the plaintiff and in election cases they become violent partisans."

Mr. Burnham cited an instance of some tall swearing in an election case where there has been open perjury.

"The court," he said "found every one guiltless and the whole audience practically went off in a dead faint. 'What do you think about compulsory voting?' asked Mr. MacLean.

"I'm against it," said Mr. Burnham. "I don't believe in driving people like cattle to the polls. The only people who don't vote now are the goody-goody who are the first to shout 'Police' but who will never raise a finger themselves."

Then the members for Peterboro, argued that "Saw-offs" in election protests should be made criminal.


DOMINION JOTTINGS

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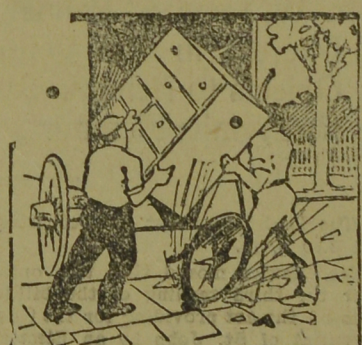
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
