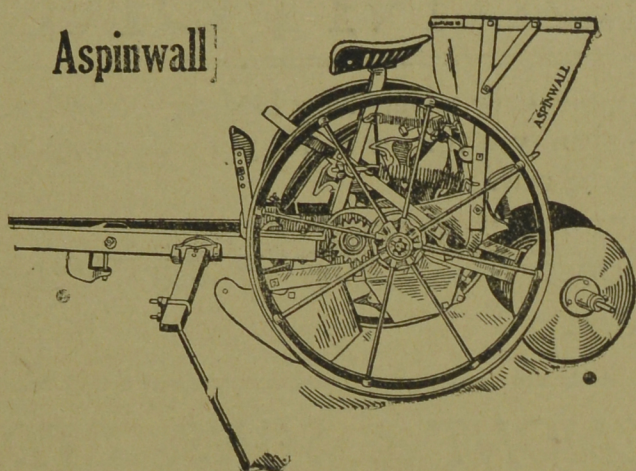

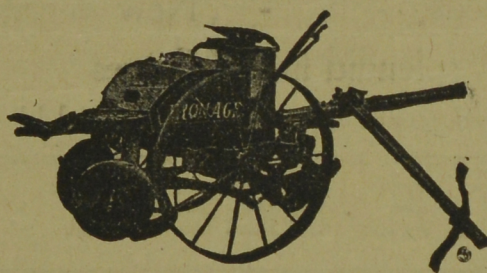

VANCOUVER LOST TO QUEBEC BY SCORE OF 10 TO 8

Citadel City Team Will Meet Wanderers at New York in Final Games

New York, March 18—Quebec won the right to meet the Montreal Wanderers in the finals of the professional hockey tournament tournament that has been running at the St. Nicholas rink, when it defeated the Vancouver six by ten goals to eight tonight. The contest gave Quebec a grand total of twenty-six goals in their two matches matches. It is a larger total than that run up by the Wanderers in the preliminary games.

BOXERS MUST BE BETWEEN 18 AND 40 YEARS

New York, March 17—A rule barring men more than forty years of age from engaging in a public boxing match in this State was adopted today by the New York State Boxing Commission at its weekly meeting.

The rule will go into effect immediately, and supplements the present one that contestants must be not less than eighteen years old, making the age limits for contestants in this state eighteen and forty years.

A CLAIM FOR \$12,000.

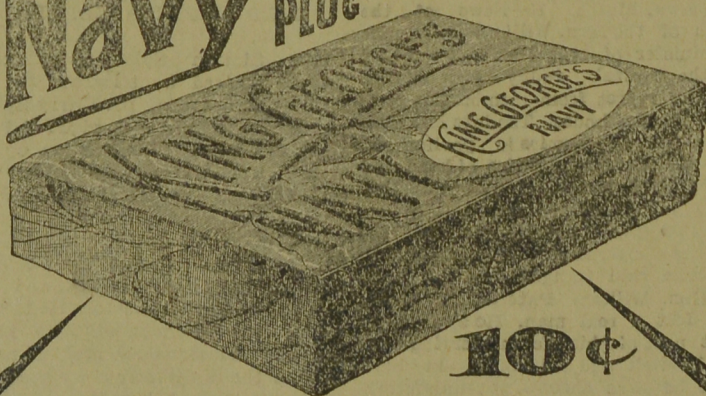

ARTIE SHAFER WILL NOT RETURN TO BASEBALL

Says Game Has Lost Its Glamor—Refuses Definitely to Rejoin New York Giants

Los Angeles, March 17—That he would not rejoin the New York Giants if Pres. Hempstead gave him the Polo Grounds for playing, was the statement made today by Artie Shafer. "I do not like baseball," said Shafer; "I do not like the life and do not like the Eastern climate. 'Big league baseball' once attracted me, but now its glamor is all gone. I have satisfied every ambition in a baseball way, and now I want to forget that I was ever in it."

"I have plenty of money and I am not dependent upon the \$7500 a year from the Giants. Last spring I signed a three-year contract with the Giants, but during our talk in the middle of the season Hempstead told me to play all of last year, and that he would consider the next two years binding."

GALLANT WON EASILY FROM TOMMY ROWAN

Chicopee, March 17—Johnny Gallant of Huntington won from Tommy Rowan of Brooklyn tonight in the eighth round of a scheduled 10-round fight before the members of the Chicopee A.C. Rowan was clearly outclassed and was badly punished. The fight was stopped in the eighth round and Gallant was awarded the decision.

"USEFUL TO KNOW"

Remember that although clear hot water sets ordinary dirt, it removes coffee and fruit stains; but clear cold water removes chocolate and cocoa.

Remember that anything in which soda and cream of tartar are used must be cooked immediately as the carbonic acid generated by the soda acid escapes quickly. Anything made light with baking powder can safely stand for a few moments as heat is needed to make baking powder expand.

Remember never to use hot water for china or glass on which gold is used. Glass decorated with gold should be left in water as little as possible.

Remember that grease is absorbed very quickly by wood. Always have sheets of blotting paper in the kitchen. If grease is spilled on the floor or tables it should be quickly taken up with the blotting paper before it has a chance to sink in the wood.

Remember that if you desire smooth mixed mustard it should be mixed with a little milk, instead of water. It will be much creamier and smoother and will keep moist longer than that mixed with water.

RECOGNIZE WELSH AT CONTENDER FOR LIGHTWEIGHT TITLE

British Boxer Has Plenty of Speed and Science But is Said to Lack the Punch

The Boston Globe has the following on Freddie Welsh's win from Joe Rivers at Los Angeles: "At the end of the twentieth round Welsh was far ahead of the Mexican on points and there was nothing for Referee Eytton to do but raise the English boy's hand in token of victory."

"Welsh kept Rivers facing the glare of the sun and worried him with his quick punch and lively footwork. In the thirteenth round Rivers forced Welsh through the ropes but failed to land any damaging blows."

"Welsh piled up his lead round by round for the first ten or twelve rounds, so that it was easy for him to slow down and still hold his advantage to the end. The fight proved that Welsh is yet to be reckoned with as a contender for the championship but it also proved that he is not as good today as he was when he last appeared here. He was slower and did not have his former stamina."

"Welsh used his left most effectively in almost every round and his blocking was perfect; but his right was of little use to him for offensive purposes and he did not use it except in overhand blows to the kidneys. He did not display anything that looked like a punch at any time, winning solely on his cleverness, speed and generalship."

CHANGE IN A THOUSAND TAKEN, BUT IN VAIN

Windsor, March 15—With the chances one to a thousand against her recovery in the event of a delicate surgical operation being performed, and with absolutely no hope of more than a few hours more of life at the most without the use of the surgeon's knife, a specially chartered train made a record run at three o'clock yesterday from South Woodlee to Windsor, carrying as its sole passengers, Mrs. Clifford Townsend, aged thirty-six, wife of a Woodlee farmer, and her medical treatment.

At 4.48 a. m. the special pulled into Windsor tunnel station, having covered the twenty-six miles from Woodlee in exactly twenty minutes. An ambulance was in waiting, and another run of two miles was made to the Hotel Dieu.

Meanwhile a long distance telephone message from Dr. J. W. Brien of Essex, the sick woman's physician, had sped over the wires to Detroit to Dr. Ernest K. Cullen, an eminent obstetrical surgeon, telling him in a few brief words of the case and its urgency, and instructing him to go at once to the Windsor Hospital and be instant readiness to operate.

A mad dash through Detroit's downtown streets in a high-powered automobile in the early morning hours brought the surgeon to the ferry dock in a few minutes, only to learn that the passenger ferries had stopped running for the night. A small boat was equally out of the question owing to the floating ice.

As a last resort Dr. Cullen ordered his chauffeur to drive full speed to the railway yards at the extreme westerly end of the city where the big car ferries make their landings. By sheer good fortune the Canadian Pacific ferry "Ontario," Capt. Carney in command was found lying in her slip.

A short talk with the skipper, and the explanation that a human life was at stake, was sufficient, and the gongs in the engine room soon sounded "full speed ahead." The crossing was made in a few minutes and Dr. Cullen was in the operating room at the hospital shortly before 5 o'clock. Meanwhile the house physicians and nurses had made everything ready. The patient, already anaesthetized, was wheeled into the amphitheatre and placed on the operating table, but she died under the knife. There was only one chance in a thousand yes, in a million, and she took it and lost.

BIG LEAGUE PLAYING IN SOUTHERN STATES.

Houston, Texas, March 18—The Houston Texas League Club defeated New York Americans today five to three. Chance used all his outfielders as pinch hitters in the ninth.

Jacksonville, March 18—The Philadelphia Americans and Chicago Nationals played a nine inning tie game here today, eight to eight. The game was called on account of darkness.

STANLEY CUP HANDLED OVER TO TORONTO CLUB

Bond Given That It Will Not be Mutilated—Has Travelled Far in Its Day

Ottawa, March 17—Toronto people will have the privilege this week of getting their first glimpse of the Stanley Cup, the battered old trophy which has been a storm centre in Canadian hockey for the past twenty years. The mug arrived from Quebec yesterday and after being examined by Trustee Foran who had requested Manager Mike Quinn of the Quebec club to send it to him. It was again encased and sent to the Toronto club, addressed to President Percy Quinn.

The Quebec Club was obliged to furnish bonds that the silverware would be taken care of, and the Torontos will be called upon to do likewise. This precaution is taken because of the fact that a number of players of the Ottawas and Wanderers mutilated it, by carving their names on the inside of the cup several years ago. The trophy arrived from Quebec without an additional mark.

The Stanley Cup is no stranger in Ottawa, but it will this week make Toronto its headquarters for the first time Quebec had it in 1912 and 1913, while Winnipeg and Montreal had won it on many occasions. No other Canadian trophy has travelled to such an extent. Hundreds of names are engraved on the base as mementos of hockey heroes of the past.

"It will be a very painful process," adds Mr. Mattingham, "a vast deal of money will be lost by it; a great deal of petty and expensive crockery will be smashed, and a great many leading articles written deploring this waste. But, to come back to Wagner's phrase, the work of 'consecrating,' the great stage that we call the world will have been taken in hand. Indeed, it has already begun!"
