## STOCK MARKET QUIET AND STEADY

New York, May 9.—While declines of half a point or so were the rule at the opening, there was no heavy selling pressure and advantage seemed to be taken of the decline for covering of shorts.

Attendance was light and dealings were almost wholly professional. The opening in Northern Pacific was made on sales of three thousand at 15 1/2 to 16. Announcement that Kuhn Loeb & Co. would not undertake financing of the road seemed to have been discounted and there was a demand for the stock at the low figure, although the short interest was probably of small proportion.

Stocks soon recovered loss shown at the opening but trading then relapsed into dullness and at the end of the first hour the market was quiet and steady. Selling of Northern Pacific was scattered and a considerable amount of it went through commission houses.

McKenna's report of Rock Island had been discounted and collateral trust 4's were quiet with prices unchanged at 34.

## FAITH HEALING ONLY A CONTRIBUTORY MEANS

London, May 5.—Spiritual faith and mental healing are dealt with in a report published today by a committee, consisting of ten representatives of the Church of England and ten medical men under the chairmanship of the Dean of Westminster, Dr. Ryle. The conclusions of the committee are: "The committee desire to express their belief in the efficacy of prayer. They reverently believe, however, that Divine power is exercised in conformity with and through the operation of natural laws. Spiritual ministrations should be recognized equally with medical ministrations as carrying God's blessing to the sick. Health, bodily and mentally, is capable of being influenced for good by spiritual means.

"The physical results of what is called faith or spiritual healing do not prove on investigation to be different from those of mental healing or suggestion. The committee recognize that suggestion is more effectively exercised by some persons than by others and this fact seems to explain the gifts of a special character the religious influences do not eschewed by various healers. While sentimentally differ in operation from the non-religious appeals to the mind, yet the former may often be a most potent form of suggestion. The that faith or spiritual healing is committee is forced to the conclusion can be expected to be permanently like all treatment by suggestion. It effective only in cases of what are called functional disorders as distinct from organic ailments.

Those who resort to healers, therefore, are warned that they may thereby be postponing until too late medical treatment which might serve to arrest organic disease. The committee desire to see increased importance attached to spiritual ministrations as a contributory means to recovery, but they strongly deprecate the independent treatment of disease by irresponsible and unqualified persons."

## A NOBLE ROMAN ON AGRICULTURE

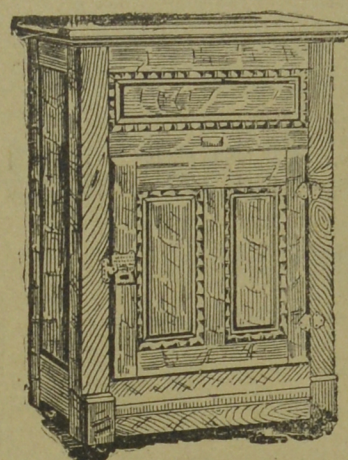
"Different, I repeat, is the method the science of the farmer from that of the shepherd—the farmer's province being such things as are made by means of agriculture to spring from the ground, the shepherd's those that spring from the flock. But as the two are intimately connected, and seeing that, as a rule it pays the owner better to have the fodder eaten on his farm than to sell it, and manuring is excellent for the fruits of the earth—for which purpose cattle are most suitable—therefore the man who owns an estate should adopt both systems, agriculture and pasture farming, and even the rearing of animals within the precincts of the farm house for from this latter also considerable profits can be made. And seeing that I have written a book on agriculture for my wife, Fundania, who has bought a farm I write this short treatise on the essentials of cattle-raising to you, my friend, Turanius Niger since you take so keen a delight in cattle—if one may judge from the frequency with which your feet bear you on Campi Maeri, with the object of thus helping to provide for expenses which make many demands upon your purse. What I write will be drawn from conversations that I had with the owners of large flocks in Epirus, when I was in command of the Greek fleets at the time of the war against the pirates."—M. T. 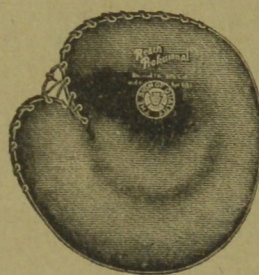
