

# STOCK MARKET

New York, May 9-While derlines of half a point or so were the rule at the opening, there was no heavy selling pressure and advantage seemed to be taken of the decline for covering of shorts.

Attendance was light and dealings were almost wholly professional. The opening in Northern Pacific was made on sales of three thousand at 15% to 16. Announcement that Kuhn Loeb & Co. would not undertake financing of the eoad seemed to have been discounted and there was a demand for the stock at the low figure, although the short interest was probably of smali proportion.

Stocks soon recovered loss shown at the opening but trading then relapsed into dulness and at the end of the first hour the market'was quiet and steady. Selling of Northern Pacific was scattered and a considerable amount of it went through commission houses.

McKenna's report of Rock Island had been discounted and collatoral trust 4's were quiet with prices unchanged at 34.






