Philadelphia, May 8--John Coombs, the Athletics' famous pitcher, will be able to get into the game again in about six weeks. That is the statement given out tonight by the physicians who examined him this afternoon.

Coombs visited today Dr. Carnett's office, where he was given a thorough examination. Dr. Carnett was well satisfied with Coombs's condition. He said that the old injuries had healed and that Coombs suffered no weakness of the back. Coombs weighs 188 pounds and looks to be in fine condition.

Dr. Carnett gave the pitcher permission to start exercising next week and to very gradually work into playing shape.

Harry Smith, the Newark manager and Kitty Bransfield, manager of the Montreal team, were members of the Pittsburgh Pirates when the team won the pennants in 1901, 1902 and 1903.

Results of Games in the Three Big Leagues Will
Give a Line on the Championship Race--Giants
and Pirates to Clash in National--Federals to
Compete With International

New York, May 9--Next week will witness the first clash of the season between the teams comprising the eastern and western divisions of the big leagues. The western outfits of the American and Federal leagues will invade the east while the Boston, New York, Philadelphia and Brooklyn teams of the National league will battle with the enemy in the West. When the intersectional series is finished it will be possible to form a pretty good line on the real strength of the different teams in the three leagues.

While George Stallings' Boston Braves will start the merry war in the West with a single game at Pittsburgh Tuesday the hostilities will not begin in earnest until the next day when Brooklyn will play in Chicago, Philadelphia in St. Louis, Boston in Cincinnati and New York in Pittsburgh.

Much interest will center in the first clash of the Giants and the Pirates. For a long time the McGraw class has been touted as the class of the National league. To uphold this reputation it will be necessary for them to show the goods when they meet the fast Pittsburgh team. Many critics predict that the Smoky City is likely to be the scene of the Giants' first cropper in the race for championship. In meeting the Buccaneers the New Yorkers will hook up with what looks to be the strongest Captain Kidd crew in years. So far this season the Pirates have waded through all the crews they have met. From which it may be forecasted with considerable certainty that the New York-Pittsburgh series will furnish some thrills.

The Brooklyn Robins look good enough to hold the Cubs at even, and the Phillies appear to be the best against the Cardinals. At Cincinnati the Red Birds should be able to fatten up their average at the expense of the Braves.

The Federal league schedule indicates that the watchful, waiting policy of the Brooklyn and Buffalo fans will end Monday for on that date the Feds will lay their first game in the two cities named. At Buffalo Otto Kpabe's Baltimore Terrapins will tackle Larry Schaff's team. On the same day the first game of the regular season will be played on the Federal grounds in Brooklyn, between the Brooklyn and Pittsburgh teams.

Monday will give Buffalo its first taste of conflicting baseball dates. On that day the Newark and Buffalo teams of the International league will play in the Bison City in opposition to the opening of the Federals.

On Thursday the western members of the Federal League will make their debut in the east. According to the league schedule St. Louis will perform in Brooklyn, Indianapolis, in Baltimore, Chicago in Buffalo and Kansas City in Pittsburgh.

At the present time Mordecai Brown's St. Louis Terriers have the call in the Federal organization in consequence of which the team piloted the old Chicago twirler is attracting much attention. Federal league fans in the East also are desirous of taking a slant at Joe Tinker's Chifeds, George Stovall's K C. Packers and Bill Phillips.

Two days prior to the Federal invasion, the American league enthusiasts in the East will be given their first peep at the wares of the western team of the American organization. Tuesday is the day on which the Western teams of the American will start their campaign. The world's champion will entertain the Cleveland Naps in Philadelphia. Boston will play host for St. Louis, Washington will welcome Chicago and New York will stage a "tango tea" in honor of Detroit. And from the way the Tigers have been going the Yankees will have to move pretty lively to catch the new steps.

An added attraction of the visit of the Chicago White Sox to Boston will take place May 23 which has been designated as "Daly Day" in honor of Tom Daly, the hard-hitting youngster with the Sox. Daly hails from Cambridge, across the river from Boston, and his opening game in the Hub will be his first performance in a big league uniform before the Yankees.

L. E. "Pop" Fletcher will train twenty head at the Worcester track. Charles Eaton has opened a public stable at the Bangor track.

Earl Pitman is getting his horses ready at Belmont Park, Philadelphia. "Red" Gerrity will soon ship from Memphis to Cleveland.

Charley De Ryder will leave California with the MacKenzie horses inside of two weeks.

Millard Sanders lately drove a green pacer by C. The Limit, 2:03 1/2, in 2:10.

BE LAUNCHED TODAY

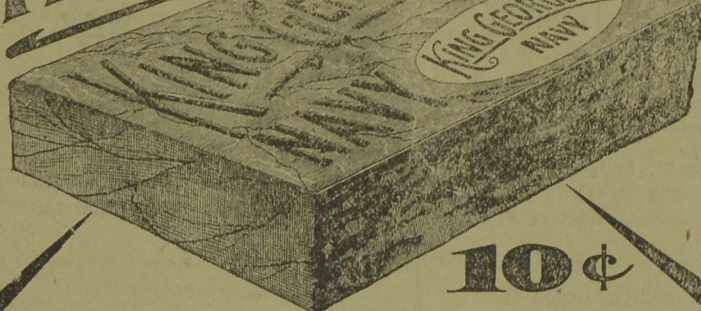
