## ENGLAND'S OLDEST BACHELOR

Robert Crichton Has Entered on His 103rd Year

The oldest bachelor in England, Mr. Robert Crichton, enters his 103rd year on Friday. He is a non-smoker and abstainer.

Born in Alyth, Perthshire, Mr. Crichton went to Australia with a brother in 1838, the voyage occupying six months. In New South Wales the brothers were cared for by their sister, and the three were so devotedly attached that they formed a compact not to marry.

After twenty years' farming the trio returned to England, and built a house at Horsham, and twenty years ago they moved to Caterham, where Mr. Crichton now resides. Before deciding to move into the Surrey town the brothers and sister visited the churchyard to see if the people of the neighborhood lived to a good age.

## HORSES FOR SLAUGHTER

Sent Last Year From Britain to Belgium and Holland

Despite all that has been said and done, there was a considerable increase last year in the number of horses exported from Great Britain to Belgium for slaughter. No fewer than 17,544 went to Antwerp, 5,838 others went to Ghent. There was, however, a decrease in the number sent to Holland, but still 2,494 went to Amsterdam and 14,870 to Rotterdam.

Only one in 800 horses died en route to Belgium, but owing to rough weather the casualty rate was higher among the animals bound for Holland. A number had to be killed.

With respect to criticisms of this traffic, the report of the Board of Agriculture states that they are not always correct. "As regards the general arrangements for the trade at Belgian ports," it is stated, "it would seem that there is not much room for substantial complaint."

It is remarked as unfortunate, however, that the necessity arises for a long journey after landing to reach the abattoirs at Antwerp, but the authorities are understood to be contemplating the erection of an abattoir nearer to the landing place.

Horses are now being sent to France for slaughter, but each animal is taxed \$10 per head.

## Parish Priest's Cattle Driven

A serious disturbance, in the course of which several people were injured in a baton charge, took place near Creggs, Galway, following an attempt by a number of tenants to drive cattle from the lands of Scathane House, acquired by a Tenants' Committee, of which Canon Geraghty, P.P., Kibbegnet, is president. Recently some tenants of the Gortnadieve section passed a resolution calling on the canon to give the land over to the Congested Districts Board or the Estates Commissioners. The Gortnadieve tenants, accompanied by a fife and drum band, cleared the lands of Scathane of the stock, which was said to belong to Canon Geraghty.

## Livingstone Relic

The latest gift to Eorropaldh Church, Lewis, is the prayer book which Dr. Livingstone carried with him during long periods of isolation in the interior of Africa. This copy of the Book of Common Prayer has been inscribed as follows by the donor, Mrs. Livingstone Wilson, the only surviving member of Dr. Livingstone's family:

"This Prayer Book, which belonged to David Livingstone, African missionary-explorer, and which was used by him on his travels, is presented by special request and under and in terms of a separate deed, to the Church of St. Moluag, at Eorropaldh, Butt of Lewis, by his daughter."

## Boys Stop Express Train

Four Reading boys, of ages ranging from twelve to sixteen, were summoned at Wokingham for trespassing on the Great Western Railway at Sonning. It was stated that after the signalman had given the line clear to the Plymouth to Paddington express the distant signal was found at danger and the train pulled up. The defendants said one of them pulled the wire attached to the signal and it went up. They then went up the pole and tried to pull it down, but failed. The boys were fined \$2.50 each, the chairman saying he hoped the parents would thrash them.

offenses and immediately open "negotiations" and "hush them up"? Such a course would be nothing less than blackmail.

But in order to check, if possible, the misleading and false impression you have been spreading, apparently with some design, night after night, in the columns of The Globe, accusing some unknown person with mysterious and dreadful doings in connection with the Dugal charges, let me say that neither Mr. Dugal, Mr. Carvell or myself ever made or received any overtures from the Flemington government or any member of it, directly or indirectly, with a view to "dropping" or "curtailing" or "hushing up" the Dugal charges.

Is this sufficient, Mr. Editor, to allay your anxiety? Or, if you must still interrogate, why not ask some of your Conservative friends some questions? For example, why has George B. 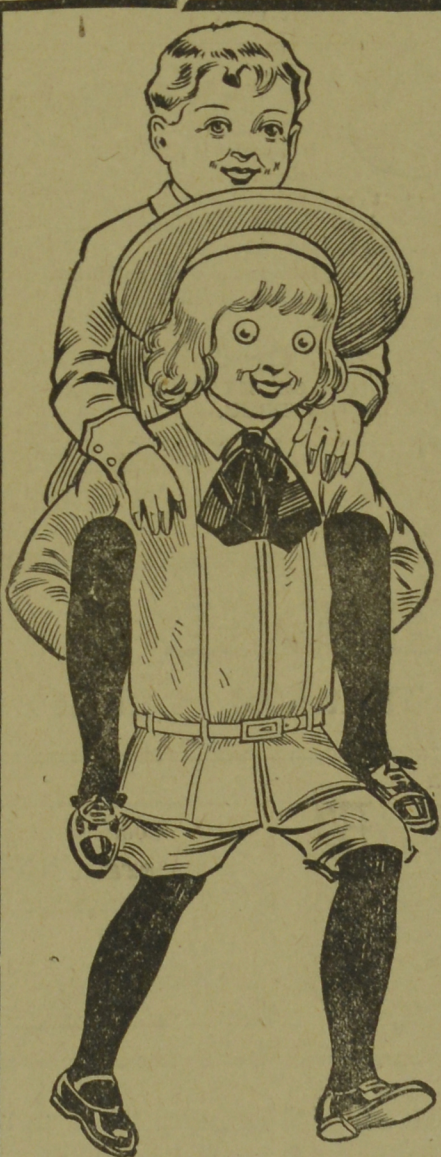
