POLICE SEIZED
CASK OF WHISKEY
AT VICTORIA'S WHARF

Thirty-gallon Cask Wrapped in Canvas
Consigned to Local Man by St.
John Shipper--Seizure Made
Last Night

A thirty-gallon cask of Scotch whiskey was seized at the wharf used by the Victoria S.S. Company last night at about eight o'clock. The cask was covered in canvas and bore only the address of the consignee, "F. Smith." It was shipped by St. John parties, arriving here Thursday night by steamer Victoria. The cask lay upon the wharf for upwards of twenty-four hours. The police had their suspicions aroused and took out a search-warrant under the Canada Temperance Act. Chief McCollom and Detective Roberts made the seizure after examining the cask, which was plainly marked "Scotch Whiskey," under the canvas. The police also forced the cask and tested the contents, making sure that it was whiskey. The liquor is now held at the police station.

Under the Canada Temperance Act, the shipper, consignee and company are liable to penalty for sending or bringing liquor into a district where the act is in force.

Ex-Ald. Robert Scott, manager of the Victoria S.S. Company, was at the wharf on business when the police arrived. When asked, he told them he knew nothing about the cask or the nature of its contents.

Speaking to The Daily Mail this morning, ex-Ald. Scott said that although he knew nothing of the circumstances of the shipment he felt safe in saying that the agent at St. John would not have received the cask if it had been given its proper

The drives so far are on the headwaters of the river but the pitch of water is good with every prospect of more water coming as a result of rain and melting snow.

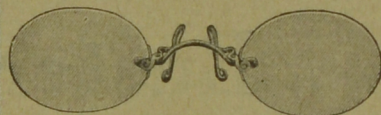
J. A. Morrison has received word that today's rain is general along the St. John River. There is a heavy run of logs at VanBuren and the river is rising at practically all points. There is no word from the drives but with the present pitch of water it is thought they are making good progress.

The drives of Fraser Limited in the central part of the province have either come out safely or are making satisfactory progress. H. P. Baird of Fredericton brought a drive of 250,000 feet on Swan Creek Thursday for that firm. On the Rusiagornish Robert Forbes got out yesterday with 1,250,000 feet for Fraser Limited. On Greer Creek Fred and Angus McLaggan are driving upwards of one million feet and expect

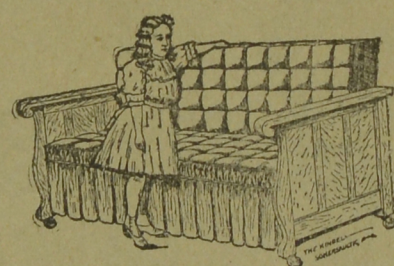

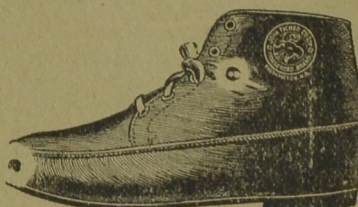

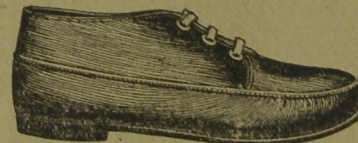
