HOUSECLEANING HELPS

Don't have a lamp in the parlor unless it is to be used, and in any case avoid fragile chignon trimmed or gathered silk shades which harbor dust.

Stuffed and buttoned upholstery is to be avoided for the same reason. Heavily carved or embossed furniture also catches the dust.

A screen if the room is a paneled one, an oak or tapestry screen—may be placed in front of the empty fire grate, but the grate itself must not be filled with paper shavings, which form only another dust trap.

The old-fashioned coal box, with a lid to lift up, is to be preferred on hygienic grounds to the newer fashion of the open coal vase, which, after leaving the coal exposed, allows to dust to escape from the room.

The new warfare against dust is being carried on in other rooms of the house.

A practical innovation in the bedroom or dressing room is the dressing table with plate glass top, which is more easily kept clean and in good condition than the shelf of polished mahogany or walnut which it supersedes. The up-to-date kitchen dresser is provided with glass doors to protect the contents of its shelves.

SOME FACTS ABOUT THE CANADIAN NORTHERN DEAL

Ottawa, Ontario, May 10th.—In case subsidies, land grants and bond guarantees the people of Canada have given to MacKenzie and Mann some \$250,000,000 or, in other words more than \$30 for every man, woman and child in the Dominion. Today, under legislation already introduced in Parliament, the Borden government proposes to grant further aid to the same two railway magnates to the amount of \$45,000,000 in a bond guarantee.

In return for this guarantee the Dominion is to receive common stock in the Canadian Northern to the face value of \$40,000,000 but stock which has had no market value up to the present and upon which not a cent has been paid in dividends. In other words, the individual share of the people of Canada at this stock, which has had no market value and has never paid dividends, is \$5 against the \$30 per capita set out above.

MacKenzie and Mann are the controlling owners of the Canadian Northern. They have issued to themselves stock in the Canadian Northern and its subsidiary companies to amount of \$138,000,000 and never paid a dollar for it.

Before dividends can possibly be paid upon the common stock of the Canadian Northern, and any return given the people of Canada for the assistance they have given MacKenzie and Mann, interest must be paid upon bonds and debenture stock to the amount of \$364,000,000.

What prospect can there be that for decades to come Canada will receive a single dollar in dividends upon the common stock to be given the Government, if indeed, a dollar is ever received? Further light is shed by the fact that the estimated net earnings of the railway for the current year will fall more than \$6,000,000 below the fixed charges.

MacKenzie and Mann are the controlling owners of the Canadian Northern Railway. The lines built by the Canadian Northern and its subsidiary railway companies have been constructed by MacKenzie, Mann and Company, contractors. The same MacKenzie and Mann who control the Canadian Northern are the MacKenzie and Mann of the company who built the roads constructed by the railway company. And MacKenzie and Mann, railway owners, awarded contracts to MacKenzie and Mann, contractors without tenders. It was a very nice arrangement for MacKenzie and Mann.

For building the Halifax and South Western—a MacKenzie and Mann Railway—MacKenzie and Mann, contractors, received \$5,663,972; for building the Canadian Northern Quebec, \$4,228,889; for work done on the Canadian Northern Ontario lines, \$52,815,623; for Canadian Northern lines from Port Arthur to the Yellow Head Pass, \$109,095,627; for Canadian Northern Pacific lines, \$34,760,509, with more to come, for smaller contracts, \$5,239,681. Not content with giving MacKenzie and Mann these fine contracts—paid for out of assistance given by the people of Canada—and giving them without tender, MacKenzie and Mann, railway owners, gave MacKenzie and Mann, contractors, the work of purchasing equipment for the railway. As a result of this move another score or so of millions was set down to the credit of MacKenzie and Mann.

How much of profit went into the pocket of MacKenzie and Mann through these arrangements is not known, may never be known; but it is reasonable to assume that upon contracts which they awarded to themselves without tender, and upon work which they themselves supervised and paid for out of cash and guarantees given them by the people of Canada, MacKenzie and Mann made an abundance of profits. They handled the money as controlling owners of the railway and they handled the money as contractors. Does anyone oppose that with such a "soft thing" as this in their control MacKenzie and Mann did not look out for themselves?

These are some of the facts which stand out in connection with the Canadian Northern and the Borden proposal to grant them further aid amounting to \$48,000,000. From these facts the people will draw their own conclusions. Nothing can wipe out the fact that already Canada has given these men \$250,000,000 in one form or another, for the construction of a railway which is not yet completed; that MacKenzie and Mann handed over rich contracts to themselves and paid the bills with money obtained from the people of Canada; that they voted themselves \$138,000,000 of stock for which they have not paid a dollar; that they are giving Canada a block of stock which has no value today and which will not pay dividends for many years, if ever, that the Borden Government sought to conceal the facts from the people and denied that assistance was to be given the Canadian Northern when negotiations between MacKenzie and Mann and the Government were actually in progress.

If there were no other question of importance this one, at least, would demand answer: If the arrangement whereby MacKenzie and Mann are to get a bond guarantee of \$45,000,000 is a good arrangement if further assistance from the public treasury is wise—why did Mr. Borden and his colleagues strive so hard to keep the facts from the public until the "deal" was completed?

MRS. WM. PUGSLEY HAS PASSED AWAY

(St. John Times)

The death of Mrs. Fannie J., wife of Hon. William Pugsley, K.C., D.C.L., M.P., former Minister of Public Works of Canada, occurred this morning at her home 17 Chipman Hill after an illness of several months. Mrs. Pugsley had been in failing health since last fall and her death, while coming as a shock, was not entirely as a surprise.

While of a retiring and home-loving disposition, Mrs. Pugsley had taken a prominent part in social life and performed with great dignity and gracefulness those public duties which fell to her lot as the wife of one of the most prominent men in public life in Canada. In private life her high character and personal attainments won for her the sincerest esteem of those who were fortunate enough to know her intimately and the respect and admiration of all those with whom she came in contact both in St. John and abroad.

Mrs. Pugsley was born in St. John, the daughter of the late Thos. Parks, one of the prominent citizens of a generation ago, whose death occurred in 1875. Her marriage took place on January 6, 1875, and she is survived by her husband, two sons, William G. Pugsley, of Montreal, who is in the city at present, John A., of this city, three grand-children and four sisters, Mrs. George F. Burpee of Vancouver, Mrs. Herbert Hall of Lloydminster, Sask., Mrs. D. A. Pugsley and Mrs. Henry Gilbert of Rotherham. The members of the bereaved family will have the sympathy of a large circle of friends in this city and throughout Canada.

The funeral will take place on Wednesday afternoon at 2.45 o'clock from her late residence, 17 Chipman Hill, to St. John's (Stone) church where the service will be held at three o'clock.
