FEDERALS AGAIN OUTDREW OTHER TEAMS AT CHICAGO

New League Has Tremendous Following There—Cubs Seriously Cut Into by New Club

Chicago, May 10—Chicago today had its first opportunity to measure the comparative interest in its three ball teams. The day was ideal and conditions were perfect. Here are the attendance figures:
Federals, 24,000.
Sox, 21,000.
Cubs, 9500.

The local Federals hooked up with St. Louis, the latter team headed by Mordecai Brown, a prime favorite, and his presence undoubtedly drew many Cub fans to the North Side.

The Sox were battling with Detroit, a combination that invariably draws out a big attendance.

On the West Side the Cubs and Pittsburgh locked horns, and these teams have always meant a big attendance here, second only to games with the Giants.

Viewed from all angles, each team seemed to make its strongest bid for a big attendance, and the comparison is made under probably the fairest conditions possible so far this season.

It must be admitted that Mordecai Brown drew many to the North Side Park who would otherwise have witnessed the Cubs-Pirates game, but it is improbable that this personal following amounted to the difference between 9500 and 14,000.

The Federals have cut into the Cub attendance much harder than into the Sox' gate receipts because of the location of the Chifeds' park. With any other team than Detroit at the West Side Park, it also is probable that many Sox fans would have journeyed to the Federals' Park.

The Sox following, however, is not easily shaken and comes out in force whether the team is winning or losing. The Cubs do not seem to have secured their old-time grip on the Chicago fans, but if they get fairly into the race many of their former adherents will return.

The following of the Federals seems even more unswerving than those of the Sox. These enthusiasts will not consider any other team or league than the Federals. For many years they have wanted a team on the North Side and the box office receipts show they were in earnest about it. Numerous semi-pro games at all the public playgrounds and corner lots also cut deeply into the attendance at the three parks.

YARMOUTH MAN CRUSHED TO DEATH

Yarmouth, N.S., May 7—Joseph W. Lambert of this town was instantly killed here at noon in one of the most shocking accidents which ever took place here. It occurred at Butler's boat shop on Water street, in launching of a large triple-screw yacht just built for J. W. Bates.

The yacht was being removed from the shed by Rupert Churchill and Lambert was one of his men. She was about half out of the shed when one of the jacks under the keel settled. Lambert, who was on the port side had gone under the craft to attend to some detail and when the jack gave way the vessel slid out and over towards the port side catching the unfortunate man beneath it. His head was caught between her bilge and one of the pilge block and completely crushed. Death was instantaneous. Another man Everett Burill was badly hurt.
