Graduates Will Begin Professional Work at Once--Western Provinces Realize Value of the Trained Forester

The foresters from the University have already left or are leaving to take up work for the summer. Mr. Kenneth Vavasour, Harry Holman, James Ketchum, Frank McGibbon and Jack Hipwell of the Junior Class will all go west in the employ of the Dominion Forestry Branch in Alberta, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, and other parts of the west, some to be forest assistants on reserves or engaged in the reconnaissance work carried on by the Forestry Branch of the Dominion Government. Mr. Don A. McDonald, of the Senior Class, enters the permanent employ of the Forestry Branch and will leave for the West soon. George H. Melrose and H. S. Laughlin of the Senior Class have accepted positions with the British Columbia Forestry Branch under H. R. MacMillan and will commence work as forest assistants, very likely under Prince, Caverhill or Murray, who have all made good and have given U.N.B. men a good reputation as well equipped, consistent workers.

Mr. C.E. Maimann, Reginald Jago, of the Sophomore Class and Guy Horncastle and C. Atkinson of the Freshman Class left today to report on the thirteenth to Rothery & Vitale, timber estimators, who have fifty men making an estimate on the limits of the John McLaren Lumber Company, Mont Laurier, Quebec, one of the largest contracts ever secured by a private firm of cruisers. MAYORALTY RECOUNT
PROCEEDINGS TAKE
UNEXPECTED TURN

On Point of Order Taken by Ald. Osborne Preceding Meeting Was Declared Illegal---Another Meeting Necessary

Affairs connected with the mayoralty election took a rather unexpected turn last night when action taken in connection with recount of ballots at a previous meeting of the city council was declared illegal on a point of order taken by Ald. Osborne, and sustained by Mayor Mitchell. The matter now stands as it did previously and a meeting of the city council must be called for its consideration.

There was a full attendance of the members of the city council last night when the adjourned meeting was called to order. Ex-Ald. W. E. Farrell, with his counsel, A. J. Gregory, K.C., and R. B. Hanson, city solicitor, were also present. Mr. Hanson asked for information as to whether he was in attendance as counsel for Mayor Mitchell or as counsel for the city. The text of the resolution passed at the previous meeting was referred to and it was found that the acting city clerk, in transcribing it in the minutes, had omitted some words and that, according to the resolution, he was counsel for the mayor. The omission was corrected, Mr. Hanson being made counsel for the city by the corrected resolution.

Upon business being taken up, Ald. Osborne arose to the point of order that business transacted at the meeting of May 6 was illegal as the meeting had not been held in the city council chamber as by law required.

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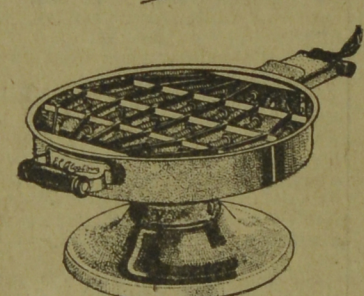


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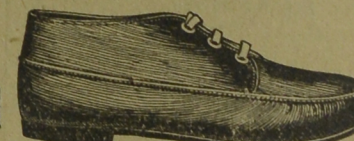
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
