Paris, Dec 21—Two new lines of German trenches are reported to have been taken by the French troops southeast of Labassee today in the redemption of the fierce attack which is being made on the enemy's position. Allied warships are aiding in the fight along the German Position in Flanders -- Servian Coast. The battle in Flanders and Northern France is steadily increasing in ferocity. The coast city of MIddlekerke has been taken but operations from the region of Nieuport are developing satisfactorily.

REINFORCEMENTS FOR THE RUSSIANS

London, Dec. 21---Reinforcements have been hurried into Poland to strengthen the Russian forces and enabling Grand Duke Nicholas to make complete dispositions of his troops for the defence of Warsaw. The Grand Duke has now more than a million men and to break through Von Hindenburg must suffer enormous losses. The Russians are massed on a front of more than sixty miles, their lines running through Skiernitewice and on to Rawa and Plica. The extreme cold is considerably hampering both armies. Regarding the campaign in Galacia, Petrogade reports that the situation is without change while Vienna admits that the Russians have been greatly reinforced
