DONALDSON'S DEATH
WAS ACCIDENTAL
SAYS CORONER'S JURY

Dr. B. M. Mullin Conducted an Inquest at Springhill Last Evening--
Several Witnesses Gave Testimony
--Evidence not Important

That Robert Donaldson was accidentally killed at Springhill, N. B. by being struck by a railway construction train on the St. John Valley Railway on evening of Wednesday, Sept. 7th., and no blame can be attached to the railway construction company (Sgd) Manuel Shewan, foreman. John McLennan. R. M. McCann. Charles H. Edgcombe. John Doherty. Benjamin Borland. William Grant.

The above was the verdict returned by the coroner's jury at the inquest last evening in the Springhill Hall to inquire into the cause of the death of the late Mr. Donaldson.

Coroner B. M. Mullin, of St Marys conducted the inquest, and the evidence taken went to show that the deceased had been walking from Springhill to the home of his daughter, Mrs. Harry McClary when he was run over by a construction train coming to this city from Hammondville.

TWO FOREIGNERS
CREATE A STIR
AT ST. MARY'S FERRY

Norwegians Drove a Horse and Wagon Down the Hill Into the River
--One Man Took a Plunge Into the Water

Considerable excitement was caused at St. Mary's late last evening when two foreigners, supposed to be Norwegians, drove a horse and wagon down the Ferry Hill into the river.

A large crowd soon gathered upon the scene and it was with much difficulty that the foreigners were extricated from their perilous position, the horse having plunged into the water up to his neck.

The team was taken up the hill, and while the owner was being notified of the mishap one of the men ran down to the river evidently with the intention of drowning himself rather than face the proprietor of the livery stable.

Two boats, equipped with searchlights, grappling irons, etc., were immediately secured and after reconnoitering around for some time the man was found about a quarter of the way across the river standing in water up to his shoulders.

Upon reaching the shore he was provided with dry clothing and allowed to sleep in one of the haymows at St. Mary's. This morning, however, he left for parts unknown, leaving his wet clothes behind him.

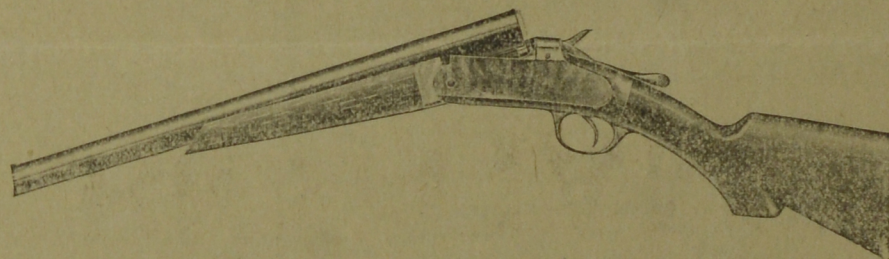
