somewhat disappointed that the realization of a great Russian victory is denied them. They take some consolation in the fact that the German attempt to pierce the Russian lines has failed, and that, suffering from heavy losses, the Germans are compelled to weaken their armies elsewhere.

The Russian report tonight says that the fight has lost some of its violence, and indicates some progress for the Russian troops south of Lodz. It is unofficially reported that the Russians are "nearly in Cracow."

While there is every indication that another big battle is imminent in the west, there is no evidence that it has actually begun. There has been fighting in Flanders, but this doubtless is the result of an attempt by the Allies to take some advanced position. There also reports that the Germans have evacuated several villages on the Yser canal, and are concentrating on new positions.

The British have taken over command of the Yser region and, like the French, have been strongly reinforced. It is believed that on the first sign of a German movement in any considerable force to the east the Allies will take the offensive in the west.

GENERAL DE WET

London, Dec. 3.—General Christian De Wet, leader of the rebellion in the Union of South Africa, has been captured, according to a Pretoria official despatch to Reuter's Telegram Company.

OFFICIAL STATEMENTS

Petrograd, Dec. 2.—The official statement issued from general headquarters tonight says:

"On Dec. 1 there was a relative lull on all the fronts. In the region of Lwow the action continued, but with less intensity.

"Towards midnight the enemy, marching in compact columns, made a fierce attack against our positions to the north of Lodz, but was repulsed."

FROM PARIS

Paris, Dec. 2.—The following official communication was issued by the war office tonight:

"In Belgium a violent bombardment of Lampernisse to the west of Dixmude, has taken place.

"In the Argonne region the enemy has blown up by a mine, the station point to the northwest of the forest of La Grurie. On the whole we affirm and are developing our progress on that part of the front.

"In Alsace our troops have taken the towns of Aspach-Le-Haut and Aspach-Le-Bas, to the southeast of Thann. On the rest of the front there is nothing to report."

FROM BERLIN

Berlin, by wireless to London, Dec. 2.—The German official press bureau today gave out the following statement:

"The Hungarian chamber of deputies has unanimously adopted the war measures submitted to it and also the arbitration convention with the United States.

"Count Karolyi and Count Andrássy, the leaders of the opposition in the Hungarian chamber of deputies announced that they would postpone criticisms of political matters until peace was restored. The house sent greetings to the army in the field and expressed admiration for the work accomplished and confidence in the ultimate achievement of a victory which will bring rich advantages to Hungary."

BOGUS COLLECTIONS.

A number of urchins who are going about the city pretending to be collecting money for the Belgians should be given a short shrift. The money they get will never see the Belgians, but will likely be invested in candy and cigarettes. Citizens should be on their guard against them.

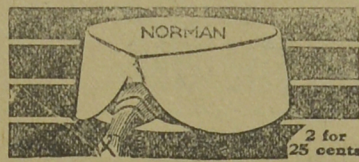
