BEST STORIES OF THE WAR

Correspondents at the front or marooned in obscure places while the great European conflict rages manage daily to get through the wary censors some little grimly humorous or tragic sidelights of the war. Here are the best that have come over the cables or by mail today:

"TOUGH AND BRAVE!"

The Kaiser has sent an autograph postcard from the front to the King of Wurttemberg, saying:

"Greetings from the camp of your regiment. I am very pleased to see troops in such excellent condition. Your Swabians are as vigorous as they are tough and brave."

The postcard is dated Nov. 23th, but no address is given.

A BRAVE WOMAN.

When the Russians broke into Hungary they immediately took a position controlling the railway line. The station master, Stefan Messary, was snout in the presence of his wife and children. Over the residence of Messary they hoisted a Russian flag, but they permitted Mme. Messary to remain there.

One evening the woman slid out, climbed the telegraph pole near by and with the receiving attachment she had brought with her, caught a despatch which was being sent to the captors of the town.

She tramped five miles to inform the Austrian commander of a threatened attack by eight thousand men. A few days later she was caught intercepting another despatch and was immediately executed.

AMBUSHED!

A letter from an English corporal who was wounded in France on Oct. 28th has just been received by a friend in New York. The corporal writes:

"Well, we were through the thickest of the fighting between Ypres and Lille. We had twelve days in the trenches, two days together without any food or water. The ration party could not get near us, the fighting was so heavy.

"About the third night we were in the trench we found we were surrounded by a much larger force than we were. The enemy opened fire and we replied. Then it came from the rear. They were in a wood where there was a lot of undergrowth and they had a machine gun playing on us. We had lost one officer and a few men, and then we were fired on from both sides—what they called enfilade fire.

"We had some of the 'Jocks' and some of the Belgians run into our trench to reinforce us. It was they who let the Germans through. We got the order to fix bayonets and charge the wood at the rear. Then you should have heard the squealing and moaning. They ran for their very lives and left their Maxim gun, which, of course, we captured. Two of our companies met them at the other end and cut them to pieces.

"One awful sight is to watch the Belgian people leaving their homes. Poor things! They just too a few things in the tablecloth, catch up the child in their arms and run like the devil.

"I forgot to tell you while we were lying in a French hospital in Boulogne we were visited by Queen Amelia of Portugal and a very nice lady she is. I made her laugh. She came to my bed. I put my hand out and shook hands. She asked how I was, and I forgot myself for the time and said: 'Very well, thank you, Your Majesty.' She said 'Very well?' and

burst out laughing, and said, 'I'm afraid you're not, but you soon will be. You have a very good spirit. That's what makes the British Tommy. He spoke a few words of encouragement and bid us goodbye.'

AN IRISH HERO.

A new story of a British encounter with the Prussian Guard was told by a corporal of the Warwickshire Regiment who is now at home wounded.

"The night the Prussian Guard attacked us around Ypres," he said, "it was only by the merest chance and a fine piece of horsemanship that we were warned in time. There was an Irishman of the King's Liverpool Regiment who had strayed out of bounds to meet a girl whose home was off the line of attack. Coming back late, he stumbled on the Germans stealing quietly toward our position. Without thought of consequences to himself, but only concerned for the safety of his comrades, he dashed toward the spot where he knew our guard to be to give the alarm. The Germans spotted him and a cavalry patrol was at his heels instantly. He had a good start but toward the end he was hit in both legs.

"He got through with the warning and is now in the base hospital pulling through. He doesn't know whether he will get a medal or a wadding for being out of bounds but he's hoping for the best."

"HAVE STRUCK SUBMARINE!"

Describing the sinking of the German submarine H-28, a seaman of the destroyer Garry says:

"One of the patrols, moving slowly out of the harbor, suddenly, 'Have struck submarine!'

"We could see the submarine making for the mouth of the anchorage, her periscope showing above the water. We went after her full pelt; we cruised about and suddenly saw the submarine come to the surface. We made straight for her at full steam.

"When the crew came up to her deck her captain, I think, waved a white pocket handkerchief. We swerved, just missing her, and turned alongside to take off the crew. As we got near, the submarine suddenly went down, throwing those on top into the water.

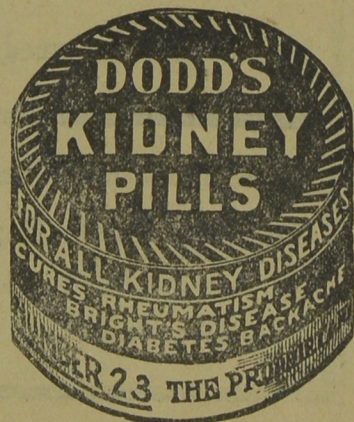

The officers and crew of the submarine, after having decided to surrender, drew lots to see who should stay below and open the valves when the safety of the others was assured.
