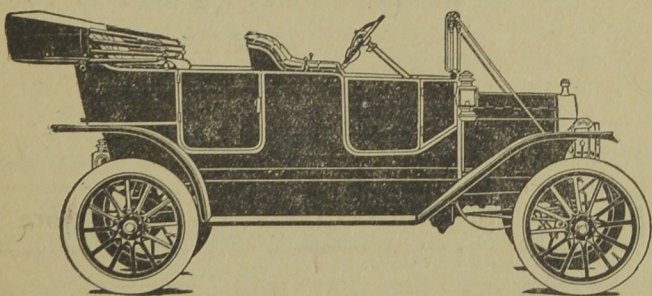

WASTE AND EXTRAVAGANCE IN EVIDENCE EVERYWHERE

Even the Chairman, Mr. Pinder, had to remark that Mr. Wilkins must be a pretty good man when he found out that of the \$133.30 of wages spent on Kennebecasis Island wharf, the affable superintendent received \$66. That runs as close to fifty per cent. of the pay list as you can get it. Bayswater wharf, which is quite handy to the Kennebecasis furnished Mr. Wilkins with \$17.50 more out of the total expenditure of \$64.00, and Dunham wharf in June found the same gentleman enjoying the green fields of the Long Reach at an expense of \$38.50 to the department. The laborers, the men who used the adds and the pick axes, received \$61.50 so on this work the play boy received even a larger proportion than usual. Taking all of these wharves into consideration Mr. Tweeddale had some remarks to make from the Opposition point of view and Mr. Jones, M. P. P. from King's took occasion to protest that the charges of the structural superintendent were not excessive, that they had to make many trips to and fro to report to the department, to carry out instructions, to buy lumber and finally to make out the accounts. But Mr. Robert J. Wilkins seems to have considered all those items in a separate account, for at the end of the King's County wharf expenditure, under the caption of "Various wharves" there is found an item of \$229.55 for "Permissive time" in visiting, reporting on the different wharves that needed repair. Also in those accounts is included the time "to secure lumber and material" so Mr. Wilkins rather anticipated Mr. Jones' explanation and provided for himself in his own proper and natural way.

The accounts of this structural superintendent are probably more open than those in most other counties. He has been a political worker since he was a voter and believes in the system that to the victors belong the spoils and he has always carried it out to the letter. But it demonstrates the system upon which the public works of the province are being performed and it shows how true the Opposition contention is that favoritism prevails, that extravagance and waste predominates, that the expenditure is out of proportion to the work performed and that the money of the people is being wasted.

At the beginning of the session of the public accounts committee Chairman Pinder sat up and took notice of what the Telegraph had reported about his remarks on the postage expenditure. He enlarged upon an error in telegraphing that made the postal expenditure in one department reach \$600 instead of \$500 which was the correct amount and then he seemed to think that it might be implied by his remark that he had seen the protest on notes paid in postage stamps that he had intended to refer to this government. Of course the Telegraph did not say that but Mr. Pinder evidently took that meaning from it. He was not in a very good humor anyway, and his opinion of Opposition newspaper writers was not most high. He was also worrying over the fact that his friend, Mr. A. C. Flemming, had been put in the public accounts as getting 314 days in in one year and together with the Auditor General he finally worked it out that the 314 days included some time in the fiscal year of 1910. He seemed to forget that there had been some statements made by the members of the government

which he supports respecting held over accounts which would not agree with his presentation of the case. But Mr. Jones came to his aid and explained how impossible it was to get all the accounts in by the end of October for work done in October. When it is considered that Mr. Flemming's work was in the legislative buildings and that he passed the public works department several times a day it would not seem to be so difficult after all to have his accounts in on time. But anything in these days serves as an excuse and there is need of a lot of them.

CORPORATION COMMITTEE.

The Corporations Committee of the provincial legislature, held their first meeting this morning, Mr. Slipp presiding, and took up the New Brunswick Hydro Electric bill.

Messrs. P. W. Thomson and W. E. Foster, two of the promoters of the bill, appeared with H. A. Powell, K.C.; M. N. Cockburn, K.C., and R. B. Hanson as counsel. J. W. McCready appeared for the New Brunswick Union of Municipalities; F. R. Taylor for Stetson, Cutler Company, and F. Howard Grimmer appeared as secretary treasurer of Charlotte county, and also, with A. C. Gillmour, on behalf of Senator Gillmour and the Gillmour estate.

PROTECTION FOR ST. JOHN.

Considerable progress was made with the bill. Regarding the section providing that before the company could enter the City of St. John with its lines, etc., it should comply with the regulations of that city regarding the use of the streets, it was suggested that the City of St. John was safeguarded in that respect under another section of the bill. Mr. J. E. Wilson, M.P.P., objected to having the section taken out of the bill, and said that while he did not wish to place any unnecessary handicap in the way of the project, he nevertheless felt that the City of St. John was in a different position to the parishes on account of the many uses to which its streets had to be put, and he urged that the section remain in the bill.

Mr. McCready on behalf of the Municipalities Union, suggested that the bill be amended so that it would provide that the company should comply with the regulations of any city or town before entering upon the use of its streets and this would protect St. John as well as other places. The section was adopted with the proposed amendment.

EX-PROPRIATION POWERS OPPOSED.

Mr. J. Howard Grimmer opposed the section of the bill giving the company expropriation powers and urged that with the development now taking place in the province, it was not well that valuable water powers should be handed over to corporations such as this bill would create. He also read a resolution passed by the Charlotte County Council protesting against the expropriation powers which the bill would give the company.

The Committee adjourned until next Tuesday morning with the suggestion from the chairman that in the meantime the representatives of the Gillmour estate and the company should get together and try to arrange upon terms whereby the company might take over the Gillmour interests.

made under the directions of these three members called the Treasury Board.

THE HIGHWAY ACT

They also claim credit for the Highway Act, an act which they had promised to the people but which after introducing and passing, they had laid on the shelf a year to dry. When that act was proposed and before it was passed, the Opposition asked that the provision for statute labor should be inserted in it, but the government and its supporters voted them down. What happened? A year later when the Act was taken off the shelf for it had never been put into operation for a day, it was brought to the House again for amendment, and the very provision that the Opposition had proposed the year before and which had been voted down by the government, was placed in it by the administration and it passed and became law. But one of the features of that act was that it caused the people to be taxed as they had never been taxed before for the up keep of the roads and there have been no results commensurate with that taxation.

BROKEN PROMISES

Another thing that the government when in opposition was always criticizing was the manner in which the public accounts were kept. When they came into power, every dollar that was expended in the fiscal year would be found in the accounts for that year. How have they kept that promise? There is a multitude of accounts held back as revealed by the statements brought down to the House and by the answers to inquiries. That will give the people a fair idea of how their performances have kept pace with their promises. They were the people who were to do everything above board, who would permit no juggling with the expenditures of the country. They were going to have everything in such shipshape fashion that with economy and businesslike methods they would keep the expenditures within the income and would reduce the public debt.

In conclusion Mr. Sweeney dealt briefly with the Valley Railway and the fact that the government came back to the House this year adopting the very provisions that had been proposed by the Opposition but which they had voted against in the session of 1910.

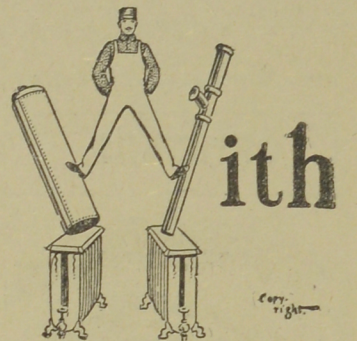
