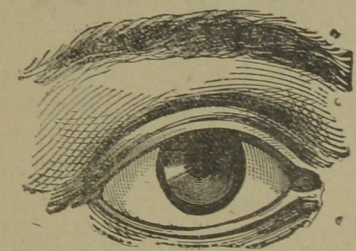

## CARL MORRIS AS

"WHITE HOPE" NOW  
 ALMOST A JOKE

Jim Stewart of Brooklyn Punched Holes through Oklahoma Giant—Morris Failed to Last

New York, March 20—Jim Stewart of Brooklyn, punctured holes in all that was left of Carl Morris as a "white hope" at the Empire A.C. tonight. The Brooklynite had all the better of five rounds, while Morris did well to gain the honors in three sessions and to make them even in two chapters.

Morris started off like a winner and smashed Stewart to shreds in the early sessions, but he soon tired and Stewart, recuperating, came back and beat him all over the ring in the last five rounds.

Both men carried out of the ring two badly damaged left eyes. Morris was the first to cut a gash. Early in the first round he drove a hard right to Stewart's left eye that nearly closed it. Undaunted by this handicap, Stewart fought back fast and served Carl a similar dose in the sixth round.

Stewart fought a great uphill battle. He was seemingly beaten to frazzle during the early part of the evening, but he apparently thrived under punishment and by driving right hooks to Carl's face and body soon had him tired and weak.

By working in close when they were half clinched, Stewart played havoc with Morris. He uprooted him frequently at close quarters, and blows of that kind hurt Morris so much that he pulled out of the clinches dazed and worried.

Morris did scarcely any real work after his eye was damaged. He simply poked his left hand straight out in front of him and threw his body after it. The stabs, whenever they landed, were weak and did not jar Stewart in the slightest.

Jim's blows, on the contrary, were short, sharp and snappy. They carried great steam and hurt Morris every time they landed. Morris was just able to wobble around the ring at the final bell, while Stewart was strong and willing to continue.

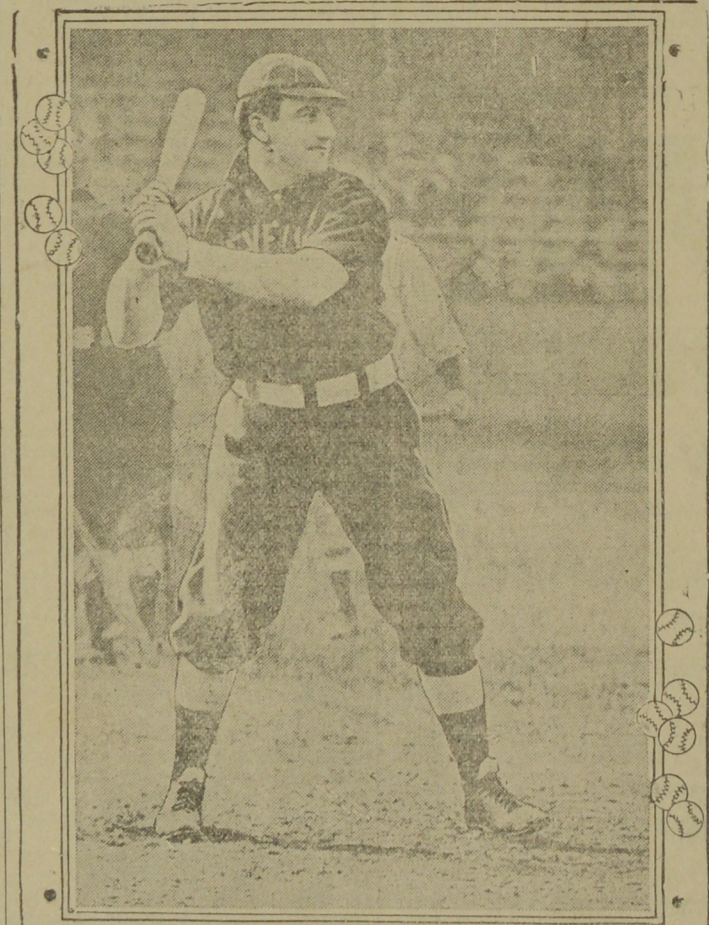
After the bout Tom O'Rourke, the manager of Al Palzer, said: "Neither Stewart nor Morris would have a chance with Palzer, and Morris the least."

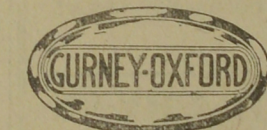
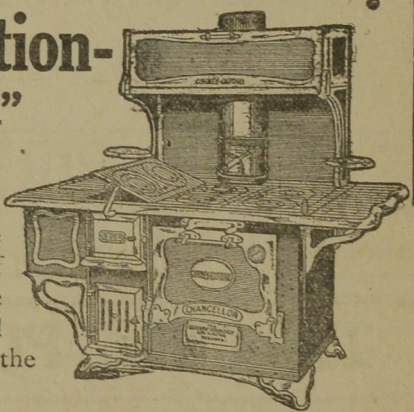
