BRITISH TENNIS TEAM TO PLAY IN UNITED STATES

Defeated French Team In Davis Cup
Series---Match to be Played at
Boston

Wimbledon, Eng., July 14—Great Britain today won the third of the singles matches in the preliminary round against France in the Davis Cup tennis tournament. The British team will consequently meet at Boston, the winning team of the Australasian-Canadian-German matches.

T. M. Mavrogordato of Great Britain won over Max Decugis of France in three straight sets, 6-1, 7-5, 7-5.

The English team will sail for the United States on Thursday, so as to have time for a few days' practice at Boston before engaging in the final round of the competition.

Mavrogordato's defeat of Decugis, the French captain, was somewhat unexpected, but Parke fulfilled expectations by beating Max Germot in the fourth singles match in three straight sets, 7-6, 6-1, 6-3.

Decugis throughout played much below form, continually sending the ball into the net and Mavrogordato was aided by a good deal of luck.

CARPENTIER SLIGHT FAVORITE FOR TONIGHT'S BOUT

Frenchmen Enthusiastic in Support
of Their Representative---Many
Clergymen to be Present

London, July 15—Boxing experts here display a remarkable even division of opinion as to the chances of "Gunboat Smith," the American heavyweight, and Georges Carpentier, the French heavyweight champion, in their twenty-round match to be fought at Olympia tomorrow night. The betting odds today were perhaps a shade in favor of the Frenchman, but this is probably due to the enthusiasm of his countrymen, of whom a huge contingent have crossed the English Channel to support their hero. They brought with them a great deal of money to back their compatriot whom they describe as a "fighting boxer" while they call Smith a "boxing fighter" and they contend that science is bound to defeat the trans-Atlantic punch.

Interest in the contest is enormous and the attendance promises to create a record for this country. Fired by the example of the Rev. John Boudier, who acted as master of ceremonies at the Welsh-Ritchie match, and by that of Rev. Evarard Digby, who occupied a similar position at the Wells-Bell match, many clergymen have secured seats at the arena and are said to intend to bring their wives with them.

FREDERICTON HORSES SHOWED WELL AT CARIBOU

Caribou Me., July 15.—James K. Newbro, the Fredericton entry from Tommy Raymond's stable, set a track record here yesterday afternoon when he paced the first heat of 2:13 trot and pace in 2:14.

The first heat of the race started what proved the greatest afternoon's racing ever seen on a half mile track in Maine, if not on any half mile track in the country. James K. Newbro won his race in three straight heats with Dimple K. second and Lady Wilkes third. The grey gelding went a great race for Raymond and by his fast heat reduced the track record from 2:15 1-4 to 2:14.

Another Fredericton horse copied first money here yesterday. Hard Luck, the pacer, recently purchased from Ira Carpenter by H. J. Morgan of Fredericton, winning the 2:22 trot and pace. The fastest heat in this race was 2:16 1-4, reducing Hard Luck's record of 2:24 1-4.

In the 2:30 trot and pace Wedgerite owned by Percy Smith of Brighton, was the winner with the best time 2:15 1-4. This was a great race and like the other two provided some excitement in every heat. Charlie Again won second money and Leila Burns, the Fredericton entry from BPI Sharen's stable, was third, with Don Pat sh fourth. The form shown by Ella Burns was one of the features of the day from a Fredericton standpoint, one Fredericton entry more being right up with the winner every heat.

SHAMROCK IV WILL SAIL FOR AMERICA JULY 18

Lipton's Yacht is Ready to Depart---
Lloyd's Not Optimistic of Success
of Challenger

Gosport, Eng. July 15.—Everything is ready for the departure on July 18 for the United States of Shamrock IV., Sir Thomas Lipton's challenger for the America's Cup. Her compasses have been adjusted, her ketch rig fitted and the steam yacht Erin, also belonging to Sir Thomas Lipton, is waiting to convey her across the Atlantic.

"Shamrock IV. has done all that has been asked of her," is the final word of Charles E. Nicholson, the designer. He admits, however, that the trial boat was in no way satisfactory as the type of opponent which would enable yachtsmen accurately to gauge Shamrock IV.'s chances of lifting the America's cup.

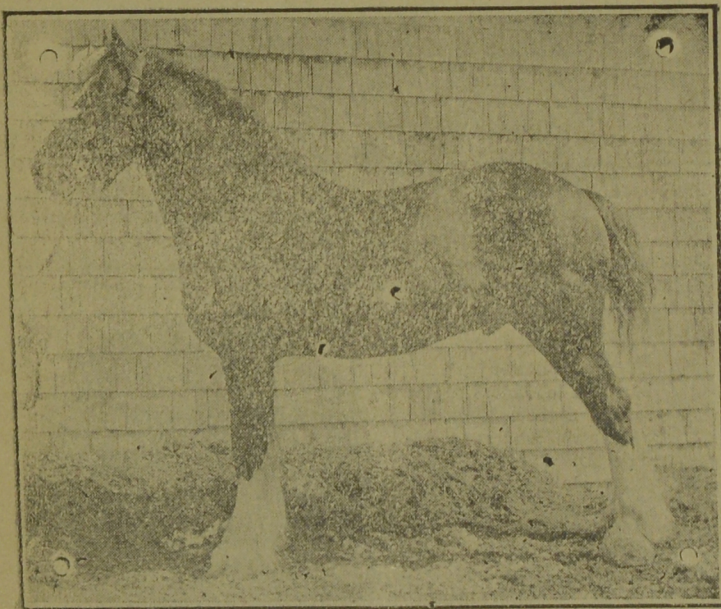

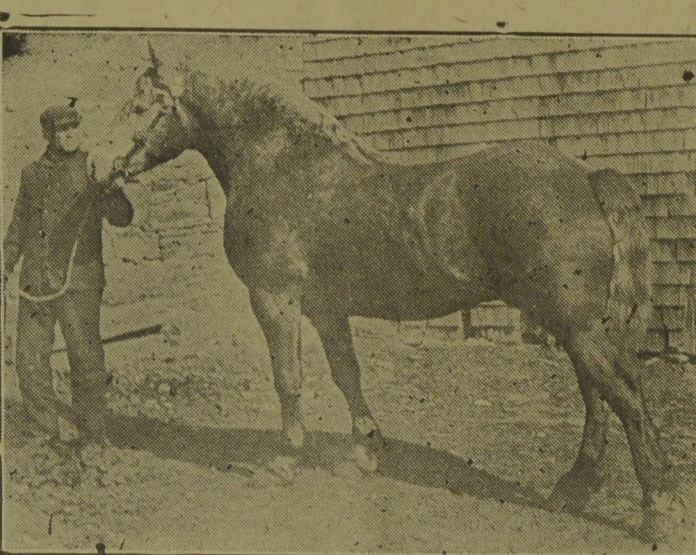

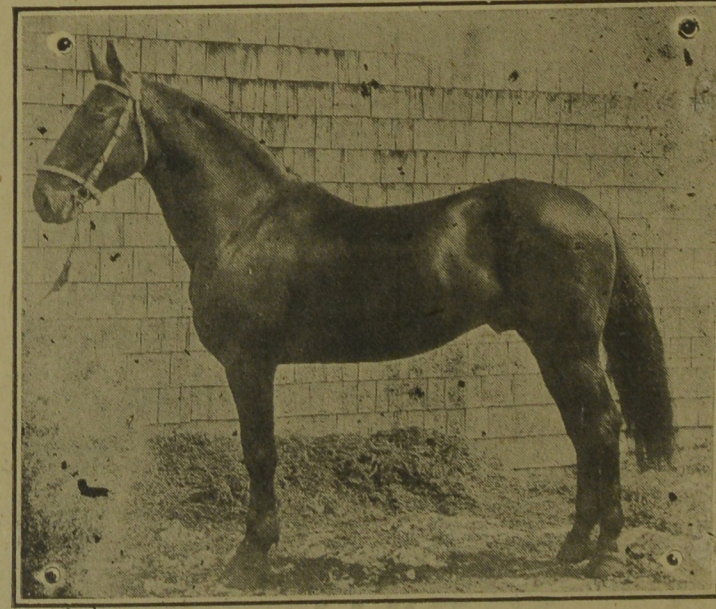
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
