actively supporting him. As to John A. Young, no one takes such a political nondescript seriously. There was not at any time since his election to a seat in parliament and abandoning the provincial arena any excuse for Mr. H. F. McLeod to interfere in this contest, more particularly to take charge of and manipulate the nomination of Guthrie against the wishes of his leading supporters. He thought he had played the political trick that was going to retain his influence in the provincial field and boasted that it must be "Guthrie or nobody," while The Gleaner, with glaring headlines, announcing Guthrie's nomination by the convention, gave the assurance that he would undoubtedly be "elected by acclamation."

Fortunately, no such result has followed. The nomination of a clean candidate of sterling integrity in the person of Mr. Scott, the support he is receiving from the strong arm of the party and the manly campaign he and his friends have conducted in spite of the characteristic scurrility and abuse heaped upon them by the local government organ, which have fallen upon the shoulders of every public man in this county and province who has incurred its displeasure or failed to ante up when called upon—justify and demand that every Liberal shall cast his vote for James M. Scott. Let there be a rally of the voters who wish a creditable representative, irrespective of party, to the polls in his support and whether he wins or loses let Liberals feel that they at least have done their duty.

If the stigma that now rests upon the county can thus be wiped out on the nineteenth instant it will be a good day's work done.

The Election for Mayor and Alderman for the City of Fredericton, for the ensuing year, will be held on Monday, the Ninth Day of March next, at the following places, viz.:

DIVISION NO. 1.

For all voters, residing or owning property above the centre line of Carlton Street, prolonged, at or near the City Hall in the said City.

DIVISION NO. 2.

For all Voters, residing or owning property in the remainder of the said City, not included in Division No. 1, at or near the County Court House in the said City.

Polls will be opened at the above named places at nine o'clock a. m. of the said day of Election, and will close at the hour of four o'clock p. m. of the same day.

Nominations for Mayor and Aldermen must be filed in the office of the City Clerk, City Hall, at or before four o'clock on Monday, the 2nd day of March, next, and must be signed by at least two qualified Electors, and the signatures attested to under oath.

Forms for Nomination can be procured at the City Clerk's Office.

A Certificate of the City Treasurer showing that all rates and taxes of the candidate have been paid within the time required by law, must be attached to each Nomination Paper.

THE BALLOT IS SECRET.

Electors of York should bear in mind that the ballot to be used in Thursday's election is absolutely secret. A printed ballot may be used or the voter may prepare his ballot at home using a piece of plain white paper upon which the name of the candidate shall be written either in black ink or with a black lead pencil. Upon entering the polling booth the voter is given an initialed envelope by the deputy returning officer. He then goes behind a screen prepared for the purpose, places the ballot in the envelope and hands the same back to the returning officer, who drops it in the ballot box. A voter is not obliged to use a ballot that may be placed in his hands by a poll worker. If a voter has not taken the precaution to supply himself with a ballot before leaving home he may obtain one in the polling booth. If the polling booth has been arranged as the law requires, there is no chance for coercion. If the voter exercises reasonable caution no living soul need know how he votes.
