ROYAL EDWARD

HAD CLOSE CALL

London, May 30—The Royal Edward arrived at Avonmouth yesterday morning. Her passengers and crew were thrown into a state of consternation when they learned the fate of the Empress of Ireland, the more so on account of the thrilling narrow escape which they themselves experienced in the ice field off Cape Race last Saturday.

In the fog a large berg was sighted four hundred yards long and lying low in the water.

The Royal Edward's engines were reversed, but an impact being unavoidable the Captain decided to take the shock end on and the liner escaped with a twisted stern and buckled plates instead of a disaster.

The Royal Edward will be forced to dry dock and will miss next week's sailing. The passengers are enthusiastic over the seamanship of the captain, who spent several days on the bridge without sleep.

GERMAN ARMY MANOEUVRES TO BE ON HUGE SCALE

Berlin, Germany, June 1—It is announced that this year's imperial manoeuvres will be on the largest and most extensive scale ever known in the German army. The troops taking part will comprise the entire 7th, 8th, 11th and 12th Bavarian army corps, together with troops from other army corps. A special feature of the manoeuvres will be that the commanders-in-chief on both sides will be allowed complete freedom of action. The manoeuvres will begin on September 14th.

The Prussian minister of war, General von Falkenhayn, described in the Reichstag a few days ago the work of applying the great army bill passed last year under the auspices of his predecessor.

Between July and October they had to arrange for the accommodation of sixty thousand men and twenty-one thousand more horses. There had been no difficulty whatever about the recruits. On the contrary there were thirty-eight thousand men perfectly

fit for service whom they could not take. There had been no reduction of the physical standard and the small percentage of recruits taken but afterwards found unfit showed a further reduction this year. There had, of course, been some anxiety about the supply of officers but there were now only about three thousand vacancies among some eighty thousand officers and he thought that all the vacancies would be filled within two years—or at the present rate of competition, much sooner. The army bill has created ten thousand new posts for non-commissioned officers.

The money voted for frontier fortifications had been duly spent and there had been very little trouble about the supply of new accommodation for the troops. Although orders to manufacturers and so on could not be given until July, everything had been arranged so quickly that on October 6th, five days after the new law had come into force, all the new units were ready and perfectly equipped for war.

WHITNEY-BACON NUPTIALS AT WESTBURY TUESDAY

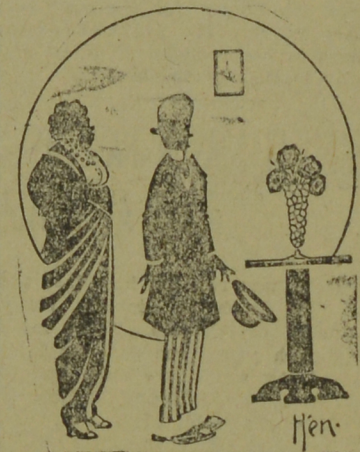

SPEAKER'S PRIVILEGES

He Can Drive Through an Arch Sacred to Royalty

Of many ancient perquisites of the Speaker of the British House of Commons only two now survive. A buck and a doe killed in the Royal preserves at Windsor are annually sent to him, and the Cloth-workers' Company of London present him at Christmas with a generous width of the best broadcloth. One curious privilege, the Speaker possesses, which he enjoys exclusively with Royalty, that is, to ride or drive through the archway of the Horse Guards. The privilege is without any practical value now, but it was a convenience in days gone by as shown by an incident which occurred in 1831.

The newspapers of the time gave sensational prominence to accounts of how Lord Chancellor Brougham forced his carriage through the Horse Guard despite the efforts of the King's Guard to stop him. The matter was brought before the House of Lords, and it appears that a Drawing Room had been held that day in St. James's Palace, and Brougham, who had been delayed by the protracted hearing of a lawsuit in the House of Lords, directed his coachman not to drive to the Palace by a roundabout way but direct through the Horse Guards. The carriage got into the yard fronting the archway before it could be stopped by the soldiers on duty. Brougham explained that he was the Lord Chancellor, on his way to the Drawing Room. This, however, availed him not. He was told by an officer of the guard that no one but the Speaker of the House of Commons was allowed to pass through, except Lord Shaftesbury, who had obtained special leave for that day only.

Brougham then said, "We must go back," and the sentinel let go his hold of the reins.

Instead of turning back, the coachman whipped his horses and drove the carriage through the arch, scattering the soldiers right and left. Brougham declared in the House of Lords that the coachman misunderstood his directions, and that for his part he was never more astonished in his life than when he found himself through the arch on his way to the Mall.

He confessed afterwards, however, that when he heard that his "own man," his "actual bootjack," Lord Shaftesbury, had the entrée, it was more than flesh and blood could bear.
