WORK OF THE NAVY

That "wearing down" process that the Germans boasted was to be their most effective weapon in a naval contest with the British turns out to be a double-edged affair, which has inflicted as much injury upon the Germans as upon the Allies.

Recently, we received word that the light cruiser "Undaunted" with a flotilla of four British destroyers succeeded in sinking four German destroyers off the Dutch coast, without the loss of one British life.

In its summing up of naval operations since the beginning of the war the British Official Press Bureau says that, even without counting in the German auxiliary cruisers sunk, the score to date decidedly favors the allied fleets.

It is definitely known that seven cruisers belonging to the Austrian and German navies have been sunk, as well as seven German torpedo boat destroyers, while reports have come from the near east of the sinking of several destroyers belonging to the Austrians.

On the other hand, the toll exacted from the allied fleets, includes one Russian cruiser and eight British cruisers, the great majority of the latter being obsolete vessels, so that their loss very little effects the fighting strength of the British fleet.

Capt. Fox, who was in command of the Amphion, when she was struck by a German mine in the North Sea, has taken ample revenge on the Germans for the dishonorable means by which they caused the destruction of his former command. The "Undaunted," too, which is just off the stocks, has already won her spurs in the line of battle.

German trade is in a terrible state. According to the Berliner Tagblatt, Germany is now prevented from doing business with twenty eight different countries, representing no less than half the total trade of the country. In addition to this enormous loss the inland trade has dwindled down to microscopic proportions, as every port is reducing expenses to their utmost capacity.

When the sheriff visited the St. John and Quebec Railway company's offices a few days ago searching for goods and chattels to satisfy a judgment, he seems to have overlooked a stock certificate which President Gould recently purchased from a Fredericton Publishing Company at a cost of \$1000. Strange that such a valuable security should have got by the sheriff.

Women do most of the work in making the ammunition for the infantry of the United States army at the Frankfort Arsenal in Pennsylvania. Seventy-five per cent of the employees are women, and they operate every piece of machinery except the annealing furnaces and the power generating machinery.

When an old peach tree was cut down in the yard of J. Edward Reed, of Los Angeles, a diamond ring was found in the nest of some blackbirds. It was Mrs. Reed's engagement ring, and was considered stolen about two years ago, when she had placed it on a window ledge, from which it was taken by a blackbird.

When M. Antoine Revelli reached his flat in Paris the other night he found in his bed, sleeping the sleep of innocence, a rosy infant. Pinned on the coverlet was a note, "My mother is dead and my father has gone to the front." He has accepted the charge so delicately laid upon him.

The members of the local government, who have been carrying on the public business of the province since the banishment of Premier Fleming in April last, will be known in future as the potato politicians.

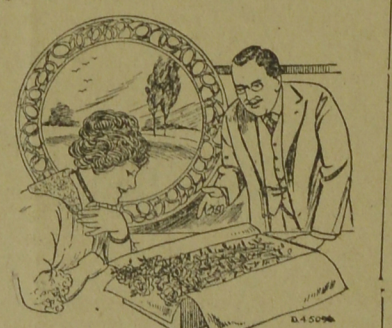
