laid on the main assertions that Crawford was last seen alive at 11.15 o'clock on the night of May 14th. At between eleven and twelve o'clock that night a farmer driving into Wainwright had seen in the bushes on the roadside near Crawford's home, a democrat, in which were two men something lying in the bottom of the wagon; that a month later farmers driving into town reported that a well on a farm four or five miles from Wainwright had been filled with manure; that this well was on a farm owned by Cook; that Crawford was murdered first and the body put into the well at a later date.

Fifty witnesses from Wainwright were subpoenaed to give evidence for the prosecution and defence.

This afternoon Mayor Mitchell forwarded the following telegram of congratulation to Mr. Samuel Cook, who, with Mrs. Cook, have been attending the trial of their son at Edmonton.

"Very glad to learn this morning that court had freed your son from any responsibility in connection with the Crawford murder. Knowing your family as Fredericton has for many years, this is a day of rejoicing with our citizens."

BE DETHRONED**

**WHAT BRITAIN HAS
ACHIEVED IN INDIA**

(Montreal Mail.)

Every seat taken on the lower floor of the Studio and many in the gallery yesterday afternoon testified to the enthusiasm of the Women's Art Society in its works for the coming year. The president, Mrs. A. W. Cochrane, was unavoidably absent, and Miss Foley first vice-president, presided. Mr. Gerald Birks could have held the audience for a very much longer time with his really superb views of India. These were taken by Mr. Birks during his travels last year. Mr. Birks took views of things in which he was interested, and his talk yesterday afternoon was a pleasantly informal chat on the various things appealing to a cultured tourist.

One is impressed with the fact that India deals only with the superlatives. Distances, wealth, magnificent buildings, views of plains, or mountains, thrilling history, ancient beginnings, treachery and cruelty or superb loyalty--all are expressed only in the superlative degree. The picture of the Taj Mahal gave the most beautiful building in the world; the view from the old fortress at Madras gave the most beautiful plain view in the world; the ancient gate of Delhi and underground dungeons in the hill country the various views of Lucknow all recall the most cruel pages of history. At this very time sprang into being that Royalty which is India's glory today. As Mr. Birks so well said: "the fathers and grandfathers of the men we shut out of Vancouver the other day made British victory possible" in the one of the most trying times of the Sepoy Rebellion.

Mr. Birks concluded by saying: A Britisher making a trip through India feels pretty proud. Old England has made mistakes; she made some bad mistakes in India, but the work of the last fifty years has been magnificent. The men in high positions are big men--big in every sense of the word. As a Harvard man said "It is one of the finest examples in the world of the effect a fine strong nation can have on a weaker one." No page in India's history is brighter than the one she turned six weeks ago, when every native state, without exception, offered men and treasure to the Empire. Germany offered treasure; India replied, "Yoy see our swords."
