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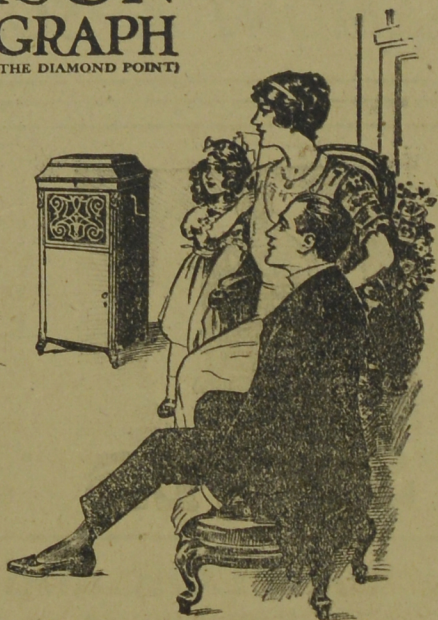

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GOVERNMENT STILL SHACKLED TO NATIONALISM

Considerable relief is being shown by Conservative papers at the fact that the troubles in the dominion cabinet have resulted in a shuffling of portfolios, the general assumption being, apparently, that the sailing will be smoother in future for the Borden ship than it has been in the immediate past.

These papers, we note, are in agreement that the appointment of the Hon. T. Chase Casgrain to the position of postmaster general, from which post on Mr. Pelletier has been removed "for the benefit of his health," will strengthen the cabinet. If Mr. Casgrain's strengthening qualities are a matter of such common knowledge, one can only wonder why they were not recognized when the cabinet was first formed.

Possibly the explanation is that Mr. Casgrain is one of the old-fashioned style of Conservatives who have no sympathy for political juggling of the Nationalist type. At the last election the Borden party owed what advantage it gained in the province to its alliance with the Nationalists, and thus the claims of the strong men of the Conservative party, of which Mr. Casgrain is now cited as a conspicuous example, were out aside for the claims of Nationalists like Mr. Pelletier and Mr. Nantel. That the Nationalists still swing a threatening club, however, is indicated by the appointment of Mr. Blondin, the foremost Nationalist in the House, to the position of minister of inland revenue.

It is evident that the Borden government, in shaking itself free of Messrs. Pelletier and Nantel, made a feeble effort to break the shackles which bind it to Nationalism. The effort was too feeble, however. The Nationalists lost no time in saying that they would not accept as substitutes either of the two members whose names were coupled with Mr. Casgrain's. Sir Robert had either to swallow the admission of another Nationalist in his cabinet or lose the Nationalist support.

Naturally he chose the former alternative, so we have the unique spectacle of the government which a week ago was bent on a "khaki" election, receiving into the inner circle the violent Blondin, who, at the famous Drummond-Arthabasca election declared that he would "shoot holes in the British flag." To complete the farce it now only remains for Mr. Blondin to be promoted in the cabinet to the post of minister of militia, which Sam Hughes says he still holds.

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A Paris correspondent, writing of Lieut. Wyndham, relates the following incident:

"You will like to hear of his gallantry. At the battle of Landrecies, where two companies of Coldstreamers held three thousand Germans at bay for four hours, he stood up and fired one hundred rounds from his revolver to allow his men to form up quietly behind him. The next day he was given 'to fall in and die like Coldstreamers.'" He was killed a week after at Soupir, near Soissons.

To Lieut. Noel, killed in action at Cambrai, the following tribute is paid:

"Always cheerful, ever thoughtful of others, the best of companions with the kindest of hearts, Jack Noel endeared himself to all who knew him and those who were privileged to be called his friends were bound to him by ties far stronger than those of common friendship."

"A wounded corporal of his regiment, who was an eye-witness of his death, stated that Lieut. Noel, despite the fact that he was hit in or near his left eye by a shot that broke the left half of his field glasses, promptly picked up his glasses again, and, finding the right half of them still workable, continued to direct the fire of his platoon with his right eye until a few minutes later he was killed by a shot in his left temple."

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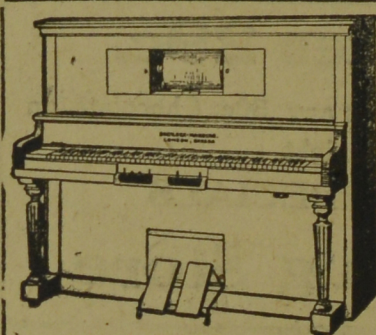
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
