HOW FREDERICTON PLAYED.

"Mike" Murphy played the best game he has played so far this year, showing all his old-time speed and endurance. He made two end-to-end rushes and scored in the first period and all through the game he made brilliant rushes which resulted in his team scoring. Fréchette played his usual spectacular game and was one of the leading goal-getters. Burden, Coward and Jack Arnold played good hockey while "Jimmy" Murphy and Titus of the defence, played in grand style. "Jimmy" rushing the puck well and Titus stopping many shots which looked like sure goals.

MARYSVILLE TEAM.

Black, Marysville's new wing player from Amherst, showed he had the required "stiff" being both a fast skater and a clever stick-hander. McMorris at rover, led in the scoring tallying in all four goals. Most of his goals resulted on account of his boring in on the net. Robertson at centre played good hockey and was always in his position at centre-ice, not missing a single pass from the wings. "Billy" Arnold on the other wing, played a fast, clean game of hockey and showed that he was a power of strength to the Crescent forwards. ENERGY IN COAL

Work Done by Men or Horses is Little in Comparison

Does any one realize the power of coal as a worker? A man was set to work to pump as hard as he could all day, and at the end of 10 hours it was found that he had done just as much work as a little less than two ounces of coal could do.

Taking all the energy put forth by a hard-working man during one whole year, the same amount of force would be furnished by 36 pounds of good coal, or say 40 pounds of average coal.

Of course, even in our best engines the greater part of the working energy of coal is wasted. But even if only one-tenth is turned to account, one and a half hundredweight of coal is equal to a man working for 300 days of the year.

A horse can do as much work as 10 men, but one and a quarter pounds of coal has as much force as a horse expends in one day. So that a ton of coal, if we could use all its force, would do as much work as six horses working for a whole year.

Boston, Mass., Feb. 6--Hundreds of star athletes, representing all the leading athletic clubs of the east, will be seen in action in Mechanics' Hall tomorrow night at the annual indoor track and field games of the Boston Athletic Association. On the entry list will be found the names of James Kohlmeier, Abel Kiviat, Alvah Meyer, Mel Shepard, J. J. Eller and scores of others.

The colleges are well represented in the entries for the team races, which are a leading feature of each year's meet. Among the college relay races will be the Yale-Harvard, and Harvard-Yale freshmen contests. Other universities and colleges that will participate in the team races will include Pennsylvania, Brown, Cornell, Dartmouth, Amherst, Syracuse, Holy Cross, Bowdoin, Williams, Columbia and Worcester Polytechnic Institute.

The special events will be the same as in past years:

The handicap events are: Three standing jumps (18 inches limit), must show a record of 31 feet; 600-yard run (30 yards limit); mile run (75 yards limit); 1000-yard run (50 yards limit); putting 16-pound shot (4 feet limit); running high jump (3 inches limit).
