SETTLES CASE WITH INCHES ESTATE

Case of Hanson vs Fredericton & Grand Lake Railway Company went to Jury Today--Other Circuit Court Cases

In the case of Marion G. Hanson vs. Fredericton and Grand Lake Railway at the Circuit Court of the Kings Bench Division during its last session, went to the jury this morning at 11.06 o'clock. Mrs. Hanson the plaintiff claimed damages amounting to about \$10,000, owing to a gravel pit being dug on a right-of-way which had been granted to her by a deed signed by Mr. Carman the former owner in 1904. Mr. P. A. Guthrie appeared for the plaintiff and Messrs. R. B. Hanson and A. J. Gregory, K. C., for the defendants. It is expected that the jury will come to a decision some time this afternoon.

ANOTHER RAILWAY CASE

The next case in the docket is that of James Cunningham vs. the St. John & Quebec Railway Co. This is an action taken for the price of concrete pipe which the plaintiff claims was supplied and defendant claims was not up to standard bargained for. C. D. Richards and R. B. Hanson are counsels for plaintiff and P. A. Guthrie will appear for the defendants.

MIDLINGS AND

BRAN SHOWING UPWARD TENDENCY

Effect Will be to Keep Flour Prices Steady--Little Canadian Wheat Moving to British Market at Present Time

Local wholesale grocers are expecting that the price of flour will remain steady for some time. During the past month the price of middlings and bran has advanced two dollars per ton. The demand for this class of mill-feed is large and it is probable that the price will go still higher.

With the market for middlings and bran in such good condition the millers are expected to turn more attention to that branch of the business. It is the general rule that when middlings and bran are bringing good prices the price of flour remains steady with little tendency to increase.

It is reported that there is very little movement of Canadian wheat to the British market this year. The price in Canada is higher than that current in England at present and as result wheat is being held in the elevators pending better prices in Great Britain. This state of affairs also will have the tendency to keep flour prices at their present pitch.
